Homemaking—

Use Chicken Leftovers for a Hot Main Dish on Monday

"WASTE NOT, WANT NOT" is a good motto these days in the face of rising food prices. If you master the tempting use of leftovers, you can work wonders. Take the remains of tomorrow's roast chicken for instance.

Use a sharp little knife and carefully strip off every last morsel and shred of the chicken meat until you have a good cupful of chicken pieces. Just one cupful is all that's needed for a delicate chicken loaf. Yet by the time it's prepared, it comes to the table in all the glory of a fresh hot main dish for dinner, sufficient to serve four or five generously. Deepen the chicken flavor by adding condensed chicken soup. This helps keep it moist. As a final touch garnish with hot grilled apricot halves.

1 can condensed chicken soup
1 cup chicken
1 1/2 cups soft bread crumbs
1 tablespoon pimiento, chopped
1 tablespoon parsley, chopped
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 eggs

Strain the rice, celery and chicken from the chicken soup. Combine them with chicken and put through the food chopper using the small blade. Then mix the chicken mixture with the soft bread crumbs, chicken, chopped parsley, salt and eggs. Put into a greased loaf pan and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 45 to 60 minutes or until firm. Garnish with grilled apricots. Serves 4-5.

Today's Recipe
RICE CROQUETS
(Makes 6 or More)
One-half cup rice, 1/4 cup boiling water, 1 cup scalded milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 egg yolks, 1 tablespoon butter.

Wash rice, add to water with salt, cover and steam until rice has absorbed water. Then add milk, stir lightly with a fork, cover and steam until rice is soft. Remove from fire, add egg yolks and butter; spread on shallow plate to cool. Shape, egg and crumb, fry and drain.
