

Brady-Cooling Wedding Is Tomorrow

Couple to Take Trip To Smoky Mountains

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Parko A. Cooling, 5838 Washington Blvd., will be the scene of their daughter Jane's wedding to Dr. Thomas A. Brady at 3:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas A. Brady of Gary are Dr. Brady's parents.

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Raymond R. Noll, rector of St. Peter and Paul Cathedral, will hear the wedding vows. Bridal airs will be played by Miss Victoria Montani, harpist, and Mrs. Ruth Gentry Edwards, violinist.

On the mantel of the fireplace before which the ceremony is to take place will stand pots of pink and white azaleas interspersed with sprays of mimosa. Below the mantel there will be an arrangement of potted juncos, pink azaleas and almond blossoms flanked by seven-branched candelabra.

At the sunroom entrance will be a pocket of pink roses and juncos and a garland of the same flowers will be draped across a wide sunroom window.

The newel post of the stairway down which the bride will come with her father will be marked by a tall cathedral candle with a Victorian bouquet of Dresden-toned flowers at its base.

Bride to Wear Satin

The bride's gown has a bodice of candlelight satin with a sweetheart neckline, long sleeves and a bow of the satin falling over the full skirt of tulie which forms a train. Pearlized orange-blossoms edge the tiara of shirred illusion which will hold her fingertip length veil. Her bouquet will be of white freesias, violets, roses and gardenias.

Heavenly blue satin will be worn by her maid of honor, Miss Jane Allison. Satin-covered buttons extend from the sweetheart neckline down the front of the fitted bodice. The train has short, full sleeves and a full skirt. She will wear a shoulder length illusion veil crowned with natural flowers and will carry a Victorian bouquet of pink camellias and carnations and blue forget-me-nots and iris tied with two-toned pink and blue ribbons falling to the hem of her gown.
