Nathan A. Cadwallar, 103, Veteran of Civil War, Dies

A week ago today Nathan A. Cadwallar celebrated his 103rd birthday. Early this morning he died, following a heart attack at his home, 5226 Broadway.

Back in '61 he donned the Blue of the North as a member of the 65th Ohio Regiment in the Civil War.

In '62 measles struck down 17 of his regiment. Pvt. Cadwallar was one of them. He and an Indiana buddy were the only two to survive, but the price was high. Left blind in one eye, young Cadwallar did hospital nursing until discharged from the army. But he had his reward, the honor of shaking hands with Abraham Lincoln.

Moved to Minnesota

Still a young man of 24, he turned to the open stretches of the west. By stagecoach he traveled to Minneapolis. By foot, over Indian trails, he traveled the 60 miles to his future home in Fairbault, Minn.

It was there that Mr. Cadwallar lived until coming to Indianapolis seven years ago.

A native of Seneca County, Ohio, the soldier, farmer, and real estate agent died in the home of his second cousin Mrs. John N. Gebhardt at the Broadway address.

Mr. Cadwallar had been a member of the Fairbault Masonic Lodge for 77 years. On his last birthday, 134 members of the lodge sent him a signed card 3 feet 6 inches wide and 4 feet 8 inches long. It was delivered by regular mail.

Funeral services and burial will be held in Fairbault. There are no immediate survivors.

SHOCKLEY FUNERAL TO BE AT FILLMORE

Funeral services for Mrs. Mary Shockley will be held at 2 p. m. tomorrow in the Methodist Church at Fillmore, of which she was a member. Burial will be in the same city.

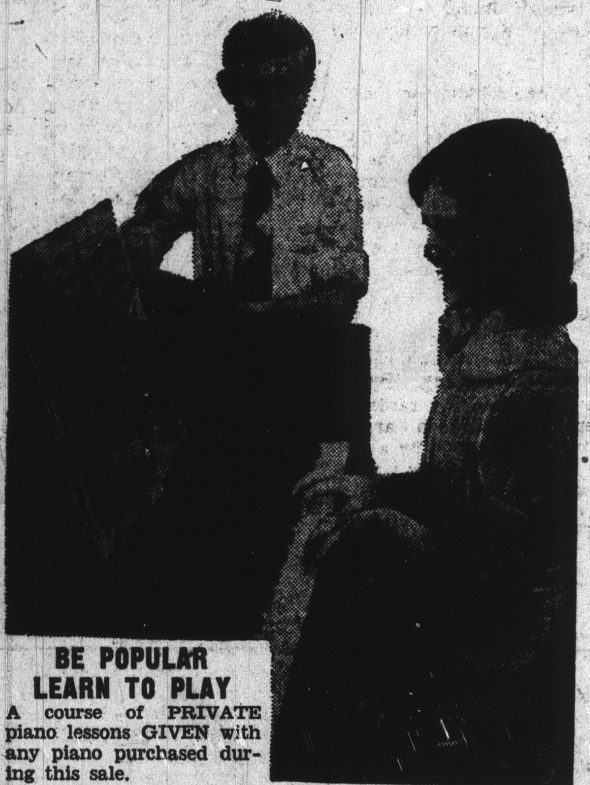
