WOMEN MOVING INTO WAR WORK

WPB Spokesman Predicts Two Million Will Be in Plants Before 1943.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 (U. P.).—War Production Board sources predicted today that more than 2,000,000 women will be working in American war industries by the end of this year—many of them performing tasks thus far assigned only to men.

These sources said about 500,000 women now have jobs in factories holding war contracts, while the National Labor Supply Board is conducting an intensive survey to find other jobs in which women can replace men who thus would be released for combatant duties.

'Air Attack' and Parade To Mark Navy Booster Day

In the lead will be a Navy Mothers' Club float. Then will come 600 soldiers from Ft. Harrison and nearly 300 Navy trainees from the Naval Armory, each headed by a band. Boy Scout, fraternal and veterans' units will follow. James C. Ahern and Ray Grider of the 12th District American Legion are in charge of the marchers.

Mothers of Hoosier Navy men will occupy a special section at the rally that night in the Butler Fieldhouse. They will be given starred Navy service placards and pins bearing the inscription, "My Son Is in the Navy."

The program at the fieldhouse is free and will include brief talks by Navy and State officials and a group of Navy recruits will take the service oath.
