

TAX HEARINGS OPEN IN WEEK

Morgenthau Will Explain

Effect of Spending

150 Billions.


WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (U. P.)—The taxpayer will get a fair idea a week from today what the expenditure of \$150,000,000,000 and more is going to do to his pocketbook.

Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau Jr. will explain to the house ways and means committee next Tuesday how he proposes to raise \$7,000,000,000 in new taxes and boost the federal government's annual income to \$27,000,000,000. The committee announced that public hearings on the tax program will start with Mr. Morgenthau's appearance.

So far the only substantial reports of what the treasury has in mind indicate that Mr. Morgenthau will suggest tapping the standard sources of revenue for more money in this manner:

1. Corporations—\$3,000,000,000.
2. Individuals—\$2,000,000,000.
3. Miscellaneous sources such as gifts, inheritances, excises, and "loop-hole" plugging—\$2,000,000.
