STAR-SPANGLED ENTERTAINMENT, based on a star-spangled life runs throughout the film, "Yankee Doodle Dandy," which opens at the neighborhood theaters today.

George M. Cohan, the "Yankee Doodle Boy," was born on the Fourth of July and literally waved the "Grand Old Flag" all his life.

The life of this man, who as a boy actor was a part of the real "Gay Nineties," who was author, composer, actor and producer before he wrote "Over There" for fighters in the world war and who received the congressional medal of honor for doing so from the hands of President Roosevelt, is re-enacted in "Yankee Doodle Dandy."

The film opens today at the Speedway and Vogue to run through Saturday, at the Zaring to run through Tuesday, at the Granada tomorrow to run through Wednesday, at the Irving to run through Tuesday and at the Ambassador Sunday to continue through Wednesday.

Walter Huston takes the part of Jerry Cohan, George's father, and Rosemary DeCamp is Nellie Cohan, his mother. Fatsy Lee Parsons is Josie, his sister, at the age of 12, and Jeanne Cagney is Josie after she grows up. Douglas Croft is George Cohan as a boy of 13, and James Cagney has the stellar role, that of George M. Cohan as a man.

Jerry, Nellie, Josie and George made up the original "Four Cohans," which many grandfathers will insist was the greatest vaudeville troupe that ever lived.

But "Yankee Doodle Dandy" is not a reminiscence. Just as Cohan himself was a smash hit on Broadway less than three years ago, so is the film of his life a very modern picture, written, directed and enacted for theatergoers of to-

day. The only thing about it that could be called old is some of the Cohan songs, and they never will grow old.

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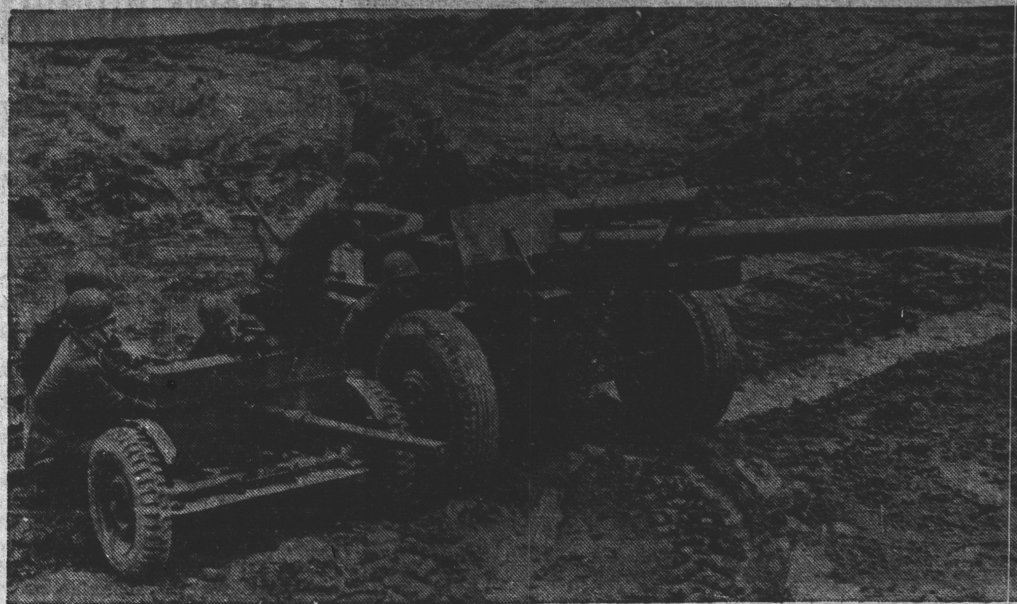
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## U. S. Brand of Death for Nazi Tanks

The purpose of the demonstration is to show an organized efficient method of giving first-aid to the injured in the event of an actual raid or other war disaster.

Victims brought into the casualty station will have simulated wounds arranged by use of wax imitations, and will be treated and bandaged by first-aiders under supervision of the physician and registered nurse who are members of the station staff. Each step in the procedure will be shown until the victims are ready to be sent home or to the hospital for further treatment.

## 'FORGIVE AXIS'—MME. CHIANG

China's First Lady Wants 'No Bitterness' in Post-War World.

NEW YORK, March 3 (U. P.).—Mme. Chiang Kai-shek, her small figure almost lost in the vastness of Madison Square Garden, told 22,000 persons last night that the united nations must try to forgive the axis nations when they are defeated.

"There must be no bitterness in the reconstructed world," she said. "No matter what we have undergone and suffered, we must try to forgive those who injured us and remember only the lessons learned thereby."

She pointed out that China had suffered for six years at the hands of Japan, longer than any other united nation and undergone the trials of aggression in this war.

"We shall hold firm to the faith that nothing short of total annihilation will ever prevent any nation from struggling against wanton domination, whether economic or political. Are we right?"

"Yes!" her audience thundered.

Doctors Order Rest

Mme. Chiang today complied with a physician's request and canceled a national broadcast to forestall "extreme fatigue." She apologized last night for not being able to accept the invitations she had received from all parts of this country and said her physicians had ordered her to rest because she had to conserve her strength to carry on her work in China.

She was dressed in a black velvet gown, embroidered in gold and braid, for the mass meeting to welcome her to New York in Madison Square Garden. It was decorated with Chinese and American flags.

She spoke softly, yet firmly, pounding the rostrum sometimes for emphasis. Almost disregarding the present conduct of the war, she spoke largely of the future, when the war is won.

"What are we going to make of the future?" she asked.

"The wisest minds in every corner of the world are pondering over this question, and the wisest of all reserve their opinion. But I venture to say that certain things must be recognized. Never again must the dignity of man be outraged as it has since the dawn of history."

Urges World Co-operation

Then she said that the united nations must demand no revenge of their enemies and:

"Finally, in order that this war may indeed be the war to end all wars in all ages, and that nations, great and small alike, may be allowed to live and let live in peace, security and freedom in the generations to come, co-operation in the true and highest sense of the word must be practiced."

"I have no doubt that the truly great leaders of the united nations, those men with vision and forethought, are working toward the crystallization of this ideal, yet they too, would be impotent if you and I do not give our all toward making it a reality."

Wendell L. Wilkie, who introduced Mme. Chiang, at her own request, called her an "evening angel... a soldier unafraid in the fight for justice."

Leut. Gen. H. H. Arnold, chief of the army's air forces, who was in China three weeks ago, and nine governors also spoke.

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## FORUM TO HEAR DR. SCHUMAN

Kirshbaum Feature Will Meet at 8:15 P. M. On Sunday.

Dr. Frederick I. Schuman, interpreter of world affairs and author, will give the final lecture on the Indianapolis Open Forum at Kirshbaum center at 8:15 p. m. Sunday.

Dr. Schuman received his Ph. D. at the University of Chicago, where he taught until 1936. He is holder of the Woodrow Wilson professorship of government at Williams college.

He will speak on "Can We Win the Peace?" Over a period of 15 years he traveled and studied widely in Europe.

Broadcast Veteran

Dr. Schuman has appeared repeatedly on the University of Chicago round table, the town meeting of the air, and other nation-wide radio programs.

Among his recent books are "A Primer of Power Politics" and "Night Over Europe," both published in 1941. Other publications include "Europe on the Eve," "Germany Since 1918," "The Dictatorship" and "The Conduct of German Foreign Relations."

Dr. Schuman's last appearance before the Indianapolis Open Forum was during the 1938-39 season.
