

POINT VALUES CUT ON TOMATO, FRUIT JUICES

OPA TAKES DRY SOUP OFF LIST

Drop in Sales Prompts Action; Frozen Foods Are Unchanged.

WASHINGTON, May 3 (U.P.)—Most tomato and fruit juices received lower point values and dried or dehydrated soups were removed from ration lists altogether in an OPA order which went into effect yesterday.

Removal of dried soups followed the complaint of dealers that their wholesale stocks had increased 80 per cent in March and much of their supplies were in danger of spoiling. These soups may be rationed again in the fall.

The fruit juice point reduction also was due to a decrease in sales. Pineapple juice was the only one not affected and it went up from 13 to 17 points for the popular No. 2½ size.

Some Fruits Increased

Items not changed include frozen fruits and vegetables, baby foods, dry beans and dry peas.

Reductions were made on certain sizes of processed apples, berries, cherries, peaches, pears, plums and prunes. Increases were made on certain sizes of canned apricots, fruit cocktail and pineapple.

Other items removed entirely from the ration list were canned corn on the cob, canned green turtle soup, clam juice, clam broth and clam cocktail.

The new values apply to G. H. and J. blue coupons which are valid until the end of May.

'FRATERNAL WEEK' IS OBSERVED HERE

Governor Schricker has designated the period beginning today and running through Saturday as "fraternal week" during which members of the Indiana Fraternal Congress will hold patriotic meetings.

40 ARRESTED HERE ON VICE CHARGES

More than 40 men and women were arrested by police in a weekend series of raids to stamp out varied forms of vice.

John H. McCarthy, proprietor of a tavern at 2140 N. Illinois st.; George Young, 2430 Pierson st., a bartender, and Roy Guyer, a cab driver who allegedly was seen carrying liquor from the place, were charged with violating the liquor law.

Willie Bridgewater, 738 N. West st., was charged with violation of the 1935 beverage act and contributing to the delinquency of a 16-year-old youth.

William A. Houk, 91 S. Fifth st., Beech Grove, was accused of selling a half pint of whisky to Otha Turner, of Southport. Both were charged beverage act violation.

Sam Barnes was charged with keeping a house of ill fame and violating the liquor law at 330 Osage st. Five others were arrested at the place.

Charges of keeping houses of ill fame also were filed against Charles Echols, 52½ Indiana ave.; Bobbie Johnson, 323 W. Vermont st., and John Montgomery, 329 Ellsworth st.

STUDY OF VENEREAL DISEASES PLANNED

A two-day institute on venereal disease will be held Friday and Saturday in Hurley Hall at the Indiana state board of health.

Miss Ethel Jacobs, director of the bureau of public health nursing, will preside over the sessions, which will be attended by public health, school and institutional nurses and social workers.

Clinical aspects of the problem as well as work of law enforcement agencies will be discussed. Coordination of military and civilian control measures will be considered. Morning and afternoon sessions will be held on both days.

WARN'S ARMY MEAT SUPPLIES IN DANGER

WASHINGTON, May 3 (U.P.)—The office of war information today warned that black market operations can cripple army and navy meat supplies.

Military meat purchases are subject to fluctuations of civilian markets, the OWI pointed out, and the black market ups meat by diversion through illegal channels.

Want to Live 100 Years? Here's the Prescription

NEW YORK, May 3.—If you want to live to be a hundred, marry, keep busy, love romance, make plans for the future, have pride in your personal appearance, develop a hobby and sharpen your sense of humor.

This would seem to be the prescription that might be written as a result of a study of a 20-year crop of centenarians numbering 450 made by Dr. Grace E. Bird, pro-

fessor emeritus of the Rhode Island State College of Education. Of these, 350 are still living.

"Life for some may begin at 100, instead of 40," Dr. Bird told the Eastern Psychological association meeting here. She located the longest-lived men and women of her study with the aid of two Eastern newspapers, but the individuals themselves were located in every state of the union.


About twice as many women as men live to be 100 or more, and all

jobs of men and women over 100 are varied and may be strenuous.

One man at 100 is an airplane spotter. Another chops wood. A woman, at 100, works in her son's candy shop.

One man was appointed deputy sheriff at the age of 100. Another man supervises the care of 68 cattle, six horses, and two mules in Arizona. One woman is an artist still painting. One preaches in a small church every Sunday.
