If You Have Ration Worries Look to Weeds—Many Are Tasty

Many wild plants that can be used for food grow along the roads and in the woods—and they require no ration points. Some crowd into our lawns and gardens where, because they are considered "just weeds," their food value is frequently overlooked, states Eva L. Gordon in a new publication on wild foods by the New York State College of Agriculture at Cornell University.

Curly dock and garden sorrel leaves may be used separately or combined to make a delicious green salad. Fresh leaves of summer muskard or burdock are also good when used in this manner. Miss Gordon recommends dandelion leaves which have been tossed with French dress-

ing and garnished with slices of hard-boiled egg and cooked beets. Leaves and stems of the common chickweed or lamb's quarters may be cooked like spinach. Purslane, which can be cooked alone or with other greens, has long been considered a delicacy in many lands. Boiling removes the sting of the stinging nettle (gloves should be worn in gathering these), and it, too, may be cooked in this manner, or used in soup.

Jerusalem artichoke, a late-season plant, is cultivated for present-day markets, but may also be found wild. The tubers of this perennial sunflower are delicious raw, as relish, or in a salad. They may be boiled or baked like potatoes. Young milkweed stalks a few

inches high can be gathered, cooked and ground, can be used as a coffee substitute.

Many of the summer and autumn fruits which we buy in the market grow wild, such as blueberries, huckleberries, wild raspberries and blackberries.

Leaves of the wild strawberry, sweetfern, or spicebush, when dried, may be used for making tea. Miss Gordon also suggests that black-birch twigs or bark of the roots may be used as a tea substitute, although she admits that none of these are as satisfying as the real thing.

Fully aware of the danger which a little knowledge carries, Miss Gordon constantly repeats this warning: "To be safe, consult notes on each wild plant before using it."

Chinese, Japs Near SCUFFLE OVER FLAG

SAN FRANCISCO, July 8 (U. P.).—Forty-seven Chinese sailors were lodged in the Alameda county jail today while authorities investigated a near-riot between the sailors and 172 interned Japanese at the Sharp park immigration detention camp, precipitated by the raising of a Chinese flag.

A spokesman for the sailors, interned for "jumping ship," said they had raised the flag and exhibited posters yesterday to celebrate the sixth anniversary of Japan's attack upon China.

The Japanese, mostly from Hawaii and held at the camp on presidential warrant, gathered in a menacing crowd, the Chinese said.

Norska, Famed Dancer, Is Dead

LOS ANGELES, July 8 (U. P.).—Death yesterday ended the career of Norska, internationally famed dancer and athlete.

Norska, in private life Mrs. Carlo Cesari, was born in Norway in 1907. She began a lifetime of stage, rodeo and nightclub appearances at the age of 7 and attained her greatest triumph in 1933 when she danced a command performance for the king of Norway.

She came to America at the age of 13, later returning to Europe on dancing tours. She was featured in George White's Scandals for several years and worked in oriental motion pictures.

ALGIERS, July 8 (U. P.).—Maj. Gen. Terry Allen and Brig. Gen. Theodore Roosevelt, American officers who participated in the African campaign, have been decorated with the Croix de Guerre for courage under fire. French authorities announced today.

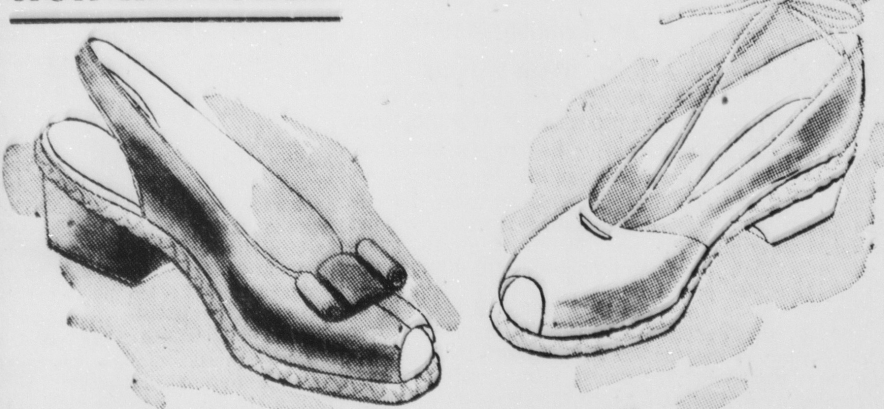
