

# LEGLESS PILOT YEARNs TO FLY

Undaunted by His Misfortune, Begs to Direct Work From Sick Bed.

WASHINGTON, July 15 (U. P.).—Loss of both legs in a Tunisian explosion failed to daunt Lt. Col. Graham W. West of Portland, Ore., one of the army air force's foremost fighter commanders, the war department said today.

"If that Englishman could do it without legs, so can I," West was quoted as saying when he regained consciousness.

He referred to royal air force squadron leader Douglas Bader, who lost both legs in a pre-war flying crash but with artificial legs became one of Britain's outstanding fighter pilots before he was captured.

West, 31, son of Mrs. Harriette K. West, 907 Southwest Stark st., Portland, holds the silver star for gallantry in action.

He was injured by a blast while attempting to check the spread of a fire aboard an abandoned German transport plane on a Tunisian beach. The blaze threatened the base of West's Spitfire group. Despite his injuries, West pleaded to be transferred from the hospital to his airdrome so he might direct his group from a bed there. The request was refused because of his condition.

INDIANAPOLIS is well on its way toward reaching its goal of 1000 army aviation cadets for July and August.

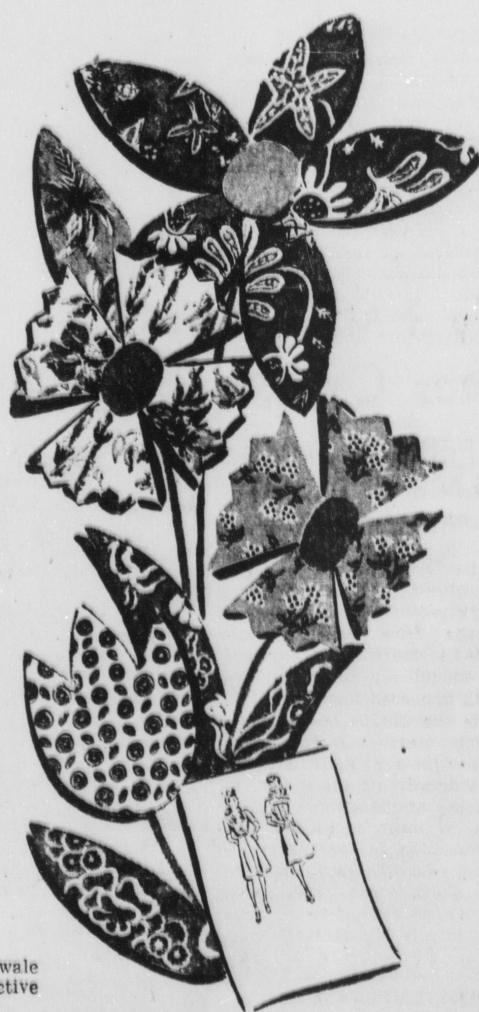
