Menjou Sees End of War

Says He Will Broadcast From Rome, Oct. 1.

LONDON, Aug. 2.—Adolph Menjou, who professes an ability to do nine things at the same time, dropped the other eight today long enough to turn prophet and prognosticator.
"The war," he said during an interval between revising a radio script, giving instructions for the care of his wardrobe, and arranging a luncheon with an admiral, "will end a year from next November."
"Matter of fact, I bet \$100 today that I'll be broadcasting from Rome on Oct. 1."

Adolph Will Tell Them
What was to have been an interview with the nattily-attired American movie star turned out to be a monologue during which Menjou revealed that:
He'll go on the air later to tell Germany, France and Italy "the war's over, and the quicker you realize it the better."
There should be 25 top Hollywood names in Britain entertaining American boys.
He should have nine secretaries, but has none.
American troops invariably blubber when he sings "Carry Me Back to Old Virginia" and "My Old Kentucky Home."

There must be a union of Russia, England and America after this war "or we might as well cut our throats and give the whole thing up."
Germans Can't Take It
Menjou was asked the basis for his prediction that the war will be over in November, 1944.
"Well, sir," he said, "I just don't think the Germans can take another winter of it. I saw some pictures in Gen. Ira Eaker's office that would stagger you. Yes, sir, they'd stagger you. There isn't even room for rubble in German cities."

Sub Commander Is Film Adviser

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 2.—Lt. Cmdr. Dudley Walker Morton, submarine commander, who recently received the Distinguished Service Cross from Gen. Douglas MacArthur, the navy cross with two stars and a presidential citation for destroying a Japanese convoy, is acting as special adviser for Warner Bros. "Destination Tokyo."
As captain of a famous submarine, the name of which is withheld by naval censorship, Cmdr. Morton sank 16 Jap craft and 20 troop barges, leaving more than 5000 Japs to drown in the sea off New Guinea, 500 miles from shore.
"Destination Tokyo," on which the commander is giving advice during a brief leave, stars Cary Grant and John Garfield. It tells the story of an American submarine much in the manner in which the studio's "Air Force" told the story of a Boeing B-17E Flying Fortress.


