Recipe for Making a Skirt



Look out, Pop! She made that good-looking skirt out of those trousers you were going to throw away, and now she's casting predatory eyes on your pet chicks.

INGENUITY IN "MAKE 'EM LAST" wartime salvage ideas appear to have settled the old gag about who wears the pants in the house. Mom or Sis can wear them—but as good-looking skirts whose bifurcated past no one would ever suspect.

It just takes a bit of simple sewing, guided by a clever pattern. In fact, the pattern frequently tells you not only how to make a skirt from a pair of trousers, but gives complete directions for making yourself a good-looking suit out of a man's single-breasted suit. For a size 12, you need a man's suit of size 36 or over, while for a 20, a man's size 38.

Men's trousers are turned upside down when being converted into women's skirts—the cuffs becoming the skirt waistband. To check quickly on whether the trousers will make a skirt for you, compare your hip measurement against the combined circumferences of the two trouser legs—at a point just below the knees of the trousers. If the trouser widths are as great or greater than your hip measurement, you'll get a skirt to fit you.

Communion Sunday to Be Marked

City's Churches to Join Nation and World In Observance.

In the little, white chapels of our army camps on the ships at sea, in hospitals, prisons, Indianapolis churches and those everywhere, Protestants will make World-Wide Communion Sunday, tomorrow.

There is hardly a home in the city that has not been touched by the war. Acutely mindful of this, ministers celebrating the communion will link the thought of youth's sacrifice for the hope of a better world, to that of Christ on the cross.

Indianapolis folk, with hearts warmed by the services, will go forth from the communion table, to make friendly calls, block-by-block, in every home in the city. The three-week visitation has been planned for months by the church federation to increase church attendance. Newcomer and longtime resident alike will be cordially invited to attend a church of his choice regularly.

Methodists will dedicate the offering to "human need," following last year's precedent when \$300,000 was raised for foreign relief and missions. Presbyterians first inaugurated World-Wide Communion Sunday as a means of creating a closer tie between the home church and that on the foreign mission field. Now, millions of Protestants, having adopted the practice, will commune quietly in their churches in fellowship with Christians around the world.

Dr. John F. Edwards is chairman of the church federation committee sponsoring the block-by-block visitation and Dr. S. Grundy Fisher, of the sub-committee. Dr. Howard J. Baumgartel is federation executive secretary and A. M. Brown, chairman of the committee on instruction.

Seek End of Absenteeism

New Plan Formed to Put Attendance Up.

"Much money, little worship; little money, much worship!" This sums up the complaint being voiced by church executives and pastors as they survey the Protestant scene in Indianapolis and the nation.

They recall that people flocked to worship during the depression, but say church "absenteeism" has become a problem with the rise of war industries and prosperity. This is in sharp contrast to the full and eager attendance of the armed forces at religious services.

The Rev. Roscoe Kirkman, who "understands how tired war workers might feel tempted to sleep through Sunday morning," will launch a new wartime plan in the West Side Christian chapel tomorrow. He has divided his congregation into 12 groups, named for the 12 disciples and assigned each a special place in the auditorium for services.

A chairman and co-chairman will be responsible for the respective groups, being cordial and interested in each person and making friendly inquiries in case of absence. Attendance records will be kept through a unique card system and Bibles awarded to the members of the group making the best record at the end of the quarter.
