

# Billy-The-Kid Will Send Alpha After The Series Alfalfa

OUT of 227 games played since the inauguration of the world series in 1903, it has been necessary to call off only three contests because of darkness. . . . Chief reason is because an earlier starting time was ordered after the 1922 series.

The opening game of the 1907 series between the Cubs and Tigers in Chicago was halted by darkness at the end of 12 innings. . . . Five years later the second contest of the Giant-Red Sox series in Boston was called after 11 rounds for the same reason.

The second game of the 1922 classic between the Giants and Yankees was stopped at the end of 10 innings. . . . The calling of this game by Umpire George Hildebrand of the American league stirred up a new riot on the field, as it was claimed that nearly half an hour of daylight remained.

Fans followed Commissioner Landis across the field with a chorus of boos after the game, being under the impression he had ordered the game halted.

The commissioner ordered the receipts, approximately \$120,000, turned over to New York charities.

### One Champ in Eight Survives

IN ONLY ONE of the eight minor leagues conducting Governors' Cup or Shaughnessy playoff series did the pennant winner during the regular season emerge triumphant in the post-season play.

Lancaster, which won the Inter-State pennant by only one game, was the lone first-place club to capture the playoffs. . . . In the other seven circuits, either the second or third-place team won the playoff honors, although in four of the circuits the pennant winner finished more than 10 games ahead of the runner-up.

In the Southern association, which returned to the split-season schedule, the first-half champion Nashville Vols annexed their fifth straight title in post-season play by defeating New Orleans, second-half winners.

Camp Grant boasts of the biggest and heaviest line in the Middle West. . . . And it is comprised of experienced players. . . . Moreover, Bachman has a classy backfield functioning behind the huge line. . . . Powerful Purdue is picked to win only after a stirring struggle.

MINNEAPOLIS baseball writers are calling on Tom Sheehan, Miller manager, to quit because of the sad showing made by his club this year. . . . If Sheehan follows the hint, Roy Ryan, Tom's assistant, probably will take over. . . . Sheehan has been at the helm of the Millers for five years.

THE Kentucky fall racing will be condensed into a 19-day meeting at Churchill Downs this season, starting Oct. 15 and continuing through Nov. 8. . . . The first six days will be to benefit the Louisville war fund.

### Steuber Gives DePauw Power

GREENCASTLE, Ind., Oct. 7.—Paced by all-American Bob Steuber, former University of Missouri halfback, and all-Big Ten Ben Johnson, one-time Purdue university center, Coach Raymond "Gum" Neal's DePauw Tigers have taken no rest this week after their 50 to 0 rout of Illinois Normal in preparing for their opening Indiana conference clash with Indiana State Teachers college Saturday in Terre Haute.

Confident of their power on the ground after rolling up 26 first downs in two games to five for their opponents, the Tigers have stressed passing and pass defense in preparation for the game with the Sycamores.

Last meeting of the two teams was in 1925 when DePauw downed State 28 to 0. In four preceding contests DePauw was undefeated, running up 134 points without being scored upon.

### Why, Joe!

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 7 (U.P.)—Joe Thorne, wealthy sportsman, today was under sentence to five days in jail on a contempt charge for failure to appear on a series of traffic citations.

The 28-year-old veteran automobile racing driver reportedly had received 16 traffic citations since 1938. His recent failure to appear, he said, resulted from a war production board order to move his Thorne Engineering Co. to Phoenix, Ariz., which made it impossible for him to be present in court.

Judge Ben Rosenthal said he had received a letter from a girl who wanted to know why she had to pay a \$20 traffic fine when "my friend, Joe Thorne, always tears them up."

Thorne denied tearing up any citations.

### Marse Joe Relies on Borowy To Take Final Tilt in Yankee Stadium; Cards Choose Brazle

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—Billy-the-Kid Southworth, gambling fearlessly for world gold and glory, completes today two of the most dramatic quick-succession flairs in baseball history, as he sends Rookie Alpha Brazle to the mound.

Southworth won against the odds in story-book fashion yesterday when he risked the grief-stricken Cooper brothers as a battery to power his Cardinal machine against the Yanks in the classic's second game.

No one knew better than Southworth the chance he was taking when he permitted Mort and Walker Cooper to go out on the Yankees stadium field before nearly 70,000 persons, just a few hours after the death of their father in Missouri. The percentage against Billy-the-Kid was increased by the fact that Pitcher Mort was recovering from a cold in his shoulder and by the widespread belief that he was allergic to American league batters who had humbled him on four previous occasions.

A Big Gamble

But Southworth, confident of his judgment of men, took the big gamble and won, as the Cards defeated New York, 4-3, to even the series.

Today comes the other scenario: script venture when he sends his kid Southworth, a 29-year-old rookie with only a half-season of major league experience under his cap. This is a greater gamble than when Southworth, in last year's series with the Yanks, chose Rookie Johnny Beazley to pitch the second game. Beazley had been with the

Rock may get a better chance to show his talents this week against Yale, which probably won't prove as bothsomes as Princeton. However, his work and the game itself will be overshadowed by the Ivy league "game of the year" between Dartmouth and Pennsylvania, at Philadelphia.

#### Will Decide Ivy's Best

The game is almost certain to decide the mythical Ivy championship and it shares top billing for the East with the Duke-Navy night encounter at Baltimore, also between unbeaten and unbeat teams.

Other eastern games include unbeaten Army and Temple at West Point, Colgate-Penn State at State college, Brown-Tufts at Providence, R. I., Rochester-Rensselaer Poly at Rochester, Coast Guard-Holy Cross at Worcester, Cornell-Princeton at Princeton, N. J., Harvard-Worcester Poly at Cambridge, Mass., and Muhlenberg-Swarthmore at Allentown, Pa.


#### 100 Home Runs




President Abe Greens said he had the assurance of both fighters that they would be prepared to meet any other recognized lightweight within a reasonable length of time after the '15 round title match.

### Shortridge Will Celebrate 50th Year of Football Tomorrow; Cathedral to Battle Washington

Shortridge will celebrate its 50th anniversary of football tomorrow when the Blue Devils face Warren Central at the North side gridiron in the first meeting of the two schools, but the clash of four city-county rivals highlights the schoolboy program for the week-end.

The clashes will bring together Manual's undefeated Redskins, who will battle the Southport Cardinals in a night game tomorrow at Roosevelt stadium, and Cathedral and Washington, who will renew their feud Saturday at the Shortridge gridiron.

Look at the hands of the county eleven last year.

Coach Clarence Brunner has announced several changes in the Red-skin lineup, including the changing of Don Hafer to fullback in place of Jim Proelich. Wayne Morical will replace Hafer at right guard. Robert Kriner is expected to start at right end for Paul Action and Ray Rader will be center for Don Smith.

Tech will be playing its first home tilt in meeting Warren Central and the Blue Devils will be out after their thirteenth straight victory. The only debout they have had in chalking up 12 victories through the past two seasons was a scoreless tie with Southport played in the rain. Governor Schricker will head the list of dignitaries who will be present at the anniversary game.

Also expected to be present are Lieut. Gov. Dawson, Mayor Tyndall, Postmaster Seldersicker, Police Chief Becker and DeWitt S. Morgan, superintendent of public schools.

Harriers to Meet

Between halves, cross country teams from both schools will compete and members of the 1893 Shortridge team will be special guests.

Cathedral's game with Washington is an added tilt to the schedule of both teams as a fill-in for open dates on the slate of the schools. They will play their regularly scheduled game Nov. 12 at Washington.

The Irish, who last week held the powerful Southport eleven to a 6-6 tie, will be handicapped by the loss of three members of the squad who are sidelined with injuries. Ray Urainy and Tommy Newett, two ball-luggers for Cathedral, were injured in the Southport clash and are not expected to see action while Capt. John Grande is still nursing injuries from the opening scrap the Irish participated in.
