MILWAUKEE, Wis., Oct. 7 (U.P.)—If a rooster crows in suburban Wauwatosa after midnight tonight, it will be against the law.

The city council, in a move to protect sleeping war workers, enacted an ordinance making it unlawful for roosters to sound their early morning reveille. Owners of the offending fowls must pay \$1 to \$15 or serve one to 15 days in jail.
