

Pleads Guilty to Slaying Baby With Poker

CHICAGO, March 3 (U. P.).—Mrs. Mildred Merkel, accused of slaying her 2-year-old daughter with a poker, changed her plea to guilty yesterday and asked that the jury be dismissed.

She persisted in her request even after the judge warned her that under such a plea she was subject to the maximum sentence of one to 14 years for manslaughter. It was indicated that the state had agreed to her request and would recommend a

punishment of no more than two to four years.

Mrs. Merkel's husband, Fred, a machinist, testified that his wife was subject to moody spells during which she appeared to be in a fog and was unable to answer questions.

Mrs. Merkel, the final witness of the day, told of an unhappy childhood after her mother died. She said she was sent to live on a farm and was mistreated and beaten.

She admitted that her first child, Beverly Jean, was born out of wedlock. She said that she had fainting spells recently and had been examined by a psychiatrist at one time, after a suicide attempt.
