to their borders. The latest was a
report from Ankara to the London
Daily Mail that a Rumanian "peace
delegation" is working feverishly to
get terms from British, American
and Soviet representatives in Tur-
key. The dispatch indicated that
the Rumanians were not being en-
couraged until they show willing-
ness to throw off the Nazi yoke
without reservations.

American Officers Lead Jugoslavs

LONDON, March 13 (U. P.).—
Two unidentified American officers
are leading partisan detachments in
successful operations on the Dalmat-
ian islands of Brac and Hvar, where
Marshall Josip (Tito) Brozovic's
forces are attempting to clear the
Adriatic stepping stones in event
of any allied operations against
the mainland of Jugoslavia, a
partisan communiqué said today.

The announcement was the first
official disclosure that American of-
ficers were taking active participa-
tion with the partisans in their
fight against the German occupa-
tion army.

The detachment on Hvar was said
to have engaged superior Nazi
forces, but reportedly took a heavy
toll of enemy troops.

On Brac, the other group of parti-
sans under a U. S. officer made a
successful attack near the township
of Pucin, capturing considerable
booty.

Million Czechs Respond to Call

LONDON, March 13 (U. P.).—A
million Czechs were believed re-
sponding today to a call from their
exile government to begin active
resistance against the Germans on
a scale that may develop into an
armed uprising.

With the Soviet army less than
120 miles from the old borders of
Czechoslovakia, the exile govern-
ment in a broadcast last night or-
dered its followers to "go over from
individual exploits to organized
mass actions."

"Form fighting detachments," the
broadcast said almost on the eve
of the fifth anniversary of the Ger-
man's entry into Prague. "Don't
resist as individuals. Set up na-
tional committees. Form armed
groups from guerrilla bands with
the most resolute men and women
capable of bearings arms."

The broadcast marked the first
formal appeal by an exile govern-
ment to its native underground to
go over to the offensive and affected
about one-sixth of oppressed Eu-
rope's potential underground army
of 6,000,000.

The other forces in France, Nor-
way, Holland, Belgium and Den-
mark remain under the earlier
orders to "organize and wait."

The Czech government promised
arms to all organized groups and
called on those unable to bear arms
to help "our national fighters ac-
cording to their abilities."

The Czech's underground sabo-
tage campaign already was believed
to have prevented much of the ex-
pected output of the Skoda arma-
ment works from reaching the Rus-
sian front. In addition to sabotage
within the works, including the
loading of shells with sawdust, pa-
triotism wrecked many armament
trains.

RATIONING DATES

MEAT—Brown Y and Z are good.
Both expire March 20. Red stamps
A5, B6, C6 D8, E8 and F8 in Book
4 good for 10 points each through
May 20.

CANNED GOODS—Green stamps
K, L and M are good, and expire
March 20. Blue stamps A, B, C, D
and E in Book 4 good for 10 points
each through May 20. Green one-
point stamps as well as tokens may
be used for change.

SUGAR—Stamp 30 in Book 4 is
good for 5 pounds, and expires
March 31. Stamp 40 in Book 4 good
for 5 pounds of canning sugar.

SHOES—Stamp 18 in Book 1 ex-
pires April 30. No. 1 "airplane"
stamp in Book 3 good indefinitely.
Another shoe stamp becomes valid
May 1.

GASOLINE—Stamp A-10 is good
for 3 gallons through March 21.

B-2 and C-2 stamps good for five
gallons until used. B-1 and C-1
good for 3 gallons each; T-2 good
for 5 gallons; E-1 good for 1 gallon;
B-1, 5 gallons. B-2 and C-2 are
good for 5 gallons. A, B, C and D
coupons must be indorsed in ink with
the automobile number and state.
Motorists should write new and old
license plate numbers on book and
on coupons.

FUEL OIL—Period 3 coupons
good through today. Period 4 and
5 coupons valid through Sept. 30.
All changemaking coupons and re-
serve coupons are now good. Con-
sumers should have used not more
than 77 per cent of their rations as
of March 4.

TIRES—Next inspection due, A's
by March 31, B's on or before June
30 and C's by May 31; commercial
vehicles, every six months or every
6,000 miles, whichever is first.

PROBE FATAL BLAST IN SUN OIL REFINERY

MARCUS HOOK, Pa., March 13
(U. P.).—Army and navy intelli-
gence agents and the F. B. I. today
investigated the blast at the Sun
Oil Co.'s Marcus Hook plant, which
killed four men Saturday night.

Two of the victims of the mys-
terious explosion that wrecked two
laboratory units of the \$13,000,000
high-octane gasoline refinery, died
instantly, while two others suc-
cumbed in hospitals several hours
after the blast.

CRASH FATAL TO TWO MOTHERS, 6 CHILDREN

WEST JEFFERSON, O., March 13
(U. P.).—Two mothers and six of
their children were killed last night
when the automobile in which they
were riding was struck by the Spirit
of St. Louis, Pennsylvania railroad
passenger flyer, at East Pike cross-
ing near here.

The state highway patrol said the
dead were Mrs. Melissa Sherman
and her two children, Betty, 14, and
Lena, 12, of Columbus; Mrs. Nellie
Lyons, and her children, Inez, John,
Shirley and another Lyons child
whose first name was not learned.

MRS. SOUSA'S RITES WILL BE WEDNESDAY

NEW YORK, March 13 (U. P.).—
Funeral services for Mrs. John
Philip Sousa, widow of the band
leader, will be held Wednesday at
the Christ Episcopal church, Wash-
ington, D. C., with burial at the
Cathedral cemetery there.

Mrs. Sousa died yesterday at her
apartment here after a brief illness.

'R' GAS COUPONS FACE NEW RESTRICTIONS

WASHINGTON, March 13 (U. P.).—
The office of price administration
announced today that new restric-
tions would be imposed on use of
five-gallon "R" gasoline ration cou-
pons through the country April 1
in an attempt to cut off a major
leak of the coupons into the black
market.

Beginning next month, OPA said,
the "R" coupons issued to farmers
and other non-highway users will
not be valid for buying gasoline at
filling stations or other retail es-
tablishments, unless the filling sta-
tion has received special authoriza-
tion.

The "R" coupons thereafter will
be used only by non-highway users
