BRITISH HANG GERMAN SPY

Attempt to Report Damage From Air Raids Is Thwarted.

LONDON, March 16 (U. P.)— Oswald John Job, 55-year-old British-born German who turned Nazi spy to get out of internment but failed to achieve his mission, was hanged today at Pentonville prison—the 14th enemy agent executed in Britain since the war began.

GIVE UP HIT-RUN THEORY IN DEATH

Believe Bert Edwards Was Victim of Fall; Had Fractured Skull.

The coroner's office today abandoned a theory that Bert R. Edwards, 49, of 15 S. Sherman drive, an accountant in the state gross income tax division, who died Monday, was the victim of a hit-and-run car.

An autopsy yesterday showed that death was due to a fractured skull probably received in one of several recent falls.

The hit-and-run theory had been advanced because last Thursday an unidentified man assisted him home, said that he had "found him at the corner" and left. The autopsy, Coroner Roy B. Storrs said, did not reveal any body injuries which would indicate being struck by a car.

Investigators learned that two days before he was brought home, Mr. Edwards had fallen against the furnace at his home and injured his head and that he had had other recent falls.

Mr. Edwards was treated at home until Saturday when he was taken to the Veterans hospital. Funeral services were held today with burial in Crown Hill.

Found Guilty in Mann Act Case, Gary Man Faces Prison

HAMMOND, Ind., March 16 (U. P.)—Eugene Sullivan, 32, once freed from prison by the suicide of a soldier to a judge, today faced sentencing on March 27 for operating what the prosecution had called "the most vicious vice ring ever to operate in Lake county."

The son of a former Gary police officer was found guilty of violating the Mann white slave act by Judge Luther M. Swigert yesterday in federal court. Miss Dena Coffman and 19 others were indicted on the charge by a Lake county grand jury.

Lake County Prosecutor Charles W. Gannon told the grand jury that the vice ring was "the largest and most vicious ever to operate in the county." Indictments against the others are still pending except for Miss Coffman. She was released upon the request of Sullivan.

STATE 4-H CLUB'S FAIR SET SEPT. 4-6

The state 4-H club fair will be held this year Sept. 4-6 at the state fairgrounds, the state fair board voted yesterday.

U. S. INVADERS HAVE RECORD TOOL SUPPLY
