floor, had spread to the second
floor when firemen arrived.

st., were fighting the flames from
the first floor, the second floor col-
lapsed on them.

A rescue squad dragged them to
safety promptly and after treat-
ment at City hospital they were de-
scribed as recovering satisfactorily.

GOVERNOR SCHRICKER, whether deservedly or not, is held responsible for most of the troubles of the Bradford-Daniels-Ostrom regular Republican organization here.

Here's the way one of the "regular" leaders states his plaint against the governor:

"The governor," he said, "came along and appointed Gen. Tyndall as head of the county civilian defense program, thus allowing him to build an organization and keep in the limelight after his retirement as a general. Result, he beat our candidate, Henry Ostrom, for the mayoralty nomination.
