L. D. CLAYCOMBE ENTERS PRIMARY
Seeking Nomination for Circuit Judge on Republican Ticket.

Lloyd D. Claycombe, Indianapolis lawyer and state representative, today announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination of circuit court judge here.
Mr. Claycombe has the backing of the regular G. O. P. organization in his bid for the nomination for the \$10,000-a-year post.
He long has been active in Republican politics here, having served as a deputy prosecutor, a member of the common council, the city plan commission and state representative.

Veterans Official
He has been a delegate to the G. O. P. state convention regularly for many years and also has been on the speakers bureau of the G. O. P. state committee. He is treasurer of Marion County Republican Veterans.
Active in a number of business enterprises in addition to his law practice, he now is president of the Commercial Indemnity Insurance Co., a director in the First Federal Savings & Loan association and vice president of the Travelers Aid society.
If elected, he said he will endeavor to conduct himself with fairness and justice to all and give to the position the diligence and industry which the place demands and requires for efficient operation. He was the Republican candidate for probate court judge in 1934.

Graduate of Indiana U.
He was born in Marengo and graduated from Jasper high school. He was graduated from the Indiana university law school in 1914 and immediately entered into the practice of law here in the office of James W. Noel. In 1919 he formed a partnership with Albert Stump, which partnership still continues.
He is married and has three children, two of whom are in the armed forces. He lives at 4301 Park ave.
He is a member of the American Legion, the Indianapolis and Indiana Bar associations, the Meridian Heights Presbyterian church, and various Masonic bodies. He is past president of the Indiana university alumni club and is past president of his college fraternity, Lambda Chi Alpha.

ATHERTON IN STATE SENATE RACE AGAIN

State Senator John W. Atherton, secretary-treasurer of Butler university and president of the Indianapolis City Plan commission, today announced his candidacy for re-nomination on the Republican ticket.
He was elected to the state senate in 1940. During the last session he served as chairman of the senate education committee. He said that if re-elected, he will continue to work for measures which would benefit education and encourage planning by the state and cities.
Mr. Atherton is married and lives at 5060 Pleasant Run blvd. His son, Dr. Hilton Brown Atherton, is an intern in a Danville (Pa.) hospital, preparing to enter the armed forces.

TWO FIREMEN HURT IN \$10,000 BLAZE

To firemen were recovering today from burns and injuries received while fighting a fire that caused about \$10,000 damage to the Uniform Hoodlance Co. plant, 1609 College ave., late yesterday.
The flames, believed to have been started by the fire kiln on the first floor when firemen arrived.
While L. Raymond Rose, of 1206 N. Dearborn st., and Firemen Joseph Kuhnert, 48, of 6116 E. St. Joseph st., were fighting the flames from the first floor, the second floor collapsed on them.
A rescue squad dragged them to safety promptly and after treatment at City hospital they were described as recovering satisfactorily.
James Anthony, 1609 College ave. president of the company, said 10 men work at the plant which manufactures snubber webbing for airplane brakes.

Politics BY EARL RICHERT

GOVERNOR SCHRICKER, whether deservedly or not, is held responsible for most of the troubles of the Bradford-Daniels-Ostrom regular Republican organization here.

Here's the way one of the "regular" leaders states his plaint against the governor:
"The governor," he said, "came along and appointed Gen. Tyndall as head of the county civilian defense program, thus allowing him to build an organization and keep in the limelight after his retirement as a general. Result, he beat our candidate, Henry Ostrom, for the mayoralty nomination."
"And then," he went on, "the governor appointed John Niblack as municipal judge, thus putting him in a position where he could keep in the public eye and build a reputation. Now, John Niblack is trying to beat our boy, Sherwood Blue, for the prosecutorship which, next to the mayoralty, is the most important job in the county to us."
"It just can't be coincidences that most of our troubles come from Republicans given appointments by the Democratic governor. He's the guy who is keeping us split up in this county."

This same speaker pointed out that Safety Board President Will Remy, also a thorn in the side of the regular organization, was the man speaker at a fraternity banquet recently which was presided over by Ray E. Smith, secretary to the governor.

Tucker, Too?
MANY FRIENDS of Lt. James Tucker, "unannounced" candidate for the G. O. P. senatorial nomination, also are inclined to lay the responsibility for what trouble their candidates has at the feet of the governor.

They find, as they canvass the state, that much of what opposition the former secretary of state has stems from the period when he was disbursing auto license bureau patronage... for every person made happy with a juicy license bureau plum several were made unhappy. And the memories of these "unhappy" persons seem to be the longest.
The Tuckerites recall how the governor very courteously turned the license bureau over to the Republican secretary of state after the supreme court's "ripper suit" decision left practically all patronage in his hands.

While there was precedent for the license bureau being placed under the secretary of state, many Democrats believed that under the court decision the governor could keep control of the department and they urged him to keep it. But he chose to make no issue of the matter, turning the bureau over to Mr. Tucker.

As a result, the youthful secretary of state who up until then had no political scars acquired some political wounds which still are open today as he seeks the G. O. P. senatorial nomination against Homer E. Capehart.

As result of this sort of thing, plus the governor's victory at the polls in 1940 and his all-inclusive defeat of the "41 G. O. P.-controlled legislature's "ripper" program, it is easy to see why Indiana Republicans have a wholesome respect for their 135-pound adversary and why they think that the term "Slippery Hank" is thoroughly appropriate.

The Pot Boils
ODDS AND ENDS: Lt. Tucker and State Auditor Richard T. James are expected to make formal announcements next week of their candidacies for the G. O. P. senatorial and lieutenant governorship nominations respectively.
... The Capehart forces are claiming the support of Robert W. Lyons, chain store lobbyist and behind-the-scenes G. O. P. power. While present at the Capehart reception for Governor Vivian of Colorado Monday night, Mr. Lyons, who usually does not attend party meetings, made it plain that he attended because he is a personal friend of Governor Schricker.

BARKLEY HEEDS OKLAHOMA CALL
Plans Speeches in Fight to Hold a Democratic Seat in Congress.

WASHINGTON, March 22 (U. P.).—Senate Democratic Leader Alben W. Barkley will go to Oklahoma next week to make two pre-election speeches in an effort to keep a Democratic house seat out of Republican hands, it was disclosed today.
Barkley, who recently criticized President Roosevelt for his veto of the \$2,300,000,000 tax bill, enters the Oklahoma contest at the invitation of Governor Robert S. Kerr and the request of the Democratic national committee.
He will speak at a Jackson day dinner at Muskogee on the night of March 27, and on the following day, when the election is to be held, at Okmulgee.
The contest involves the state's second district which, until the 1942 election, was strongly Democratic for years.

Democratic Senator Breaks With Roosevelt

CHICAGO, March 22 (U. P.).—Senator Edwin C. Johnson (D. Colo.), charged last night that "one man control" has reduced to hopeless impotency the once great and powerful democratic party, which no longer has the "inclination or the will to resist those who rape it."
Johnson, in an address at Northpark college in which he formally broke with the administration, deplored the President's "assumption of the powers of Congress" and advocated a change in government to permit a vote of confidence in the executive department so that "the people, through their representatives are always in control."

Former Congressman Urdike Files for GOP Nomination

Former Congressman Ralph E. Urdike, now a marine corps captain stationed in Washington, today filed his declaration of candidacy for the G. O. P. nomination for congress from this district.
The declaration was filed at the secretary of state's office by the former congressman's son, Ralph E. Urdike Jr.
Capt. Urdike served in congress from this district from 1926 to 1929; being defeated by the incumbent Democratic congressman, Louis Ludlow.

Policeman Seeks Office of Sheriff

CHARLES CLEMENS, Indianapolis park policeman and former member of the regular Indianapolis police force, today announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for sheriff here.
Mr. Clemens said he had the support of the city hall Victory organization in his bid for the nomination in opposition to Sheriff Otto Pettit who is seeking re-nomination with the backing of the regular organization.
Mr. Clemens, in a five-point platform, pledged:
Strict law enforcement with experienced deputies.
Co-operation and harmony with the police department and prosecutor's office.
Patrol of roads 24 hours a day by three eight-hour shifts.
Support of Mayor Tyndall and his policy.
A square deal for all, regardless of creed or color.
Mr. Clemens is married and lives at 337 N. Summit ave. He is a native of Indianapolis.
