**YOUR VICTORY GARDEN**

**Early Indoor Start Gives Head Lettuce Best Chance**

LETTUCE, with its many varieties, is the most popular plant for salads. To be tastiest it must be grown rapidly during the warm days and cool nights of late spring and early autumn. Hot weather produces plants which grow quickly to seed without heading up.

A limed and well-drained soil, enriched with manure prior to sowing, is most satisfactory. Side dressing with ammonium sulfate is the recommended source of nitrogen to stimulate growth. Other sources of nitrogen are apt to cause tip burn.

Manure is highly recommended as a soil conditioner and should be worked well into the soil the previous fall if possible. Water should be available during the growing season to insure rapid growth. Since head lettuce requires from 75 to 90 days to form, it behooves the gardener who wondered why his failed, to start plants indoor at once.

**Transplanting Method**

Lettuce just will not head up in hot June and July. Seed is sown in flats and in a sandy soil, transplanted to the cold frame when 2 to 3 inches high, spaced 2 to 3 inches apart, allowed to grow on

for a month and then transplanted to the garden.

By that time the transplants are 4 to 5 inches high and if dipped in transplantone, will continue their growth without interruption. Transplant on a sunny day when the temperature is above 40 degrees and place a foot apart in rows. Recommended head lettuce varieties include Cosberg, 76 days to maturity from seed; Cosberg 600, 65 days; Iceberg, 84 days; New York No. 12, 80 days; Vaughn's Big Boston, 75 days, and Great Lakes, 75 days. The last is an All-America prize winner and considered the best hot weather head lettuce.

Leaf lettuce seed is sown as soon in the spring as the soil is ready. Seeds are placed 10 to the foot and covered with one-half inch of soil. If the soil is well fertilized the lettuce will grow fast. First thinnings are to stand an inch apart, then thin out alternate plants until they are 8 inches apart. Successive sowings will prolong the season, but fertilizer must be worked into the row prior to seeding.

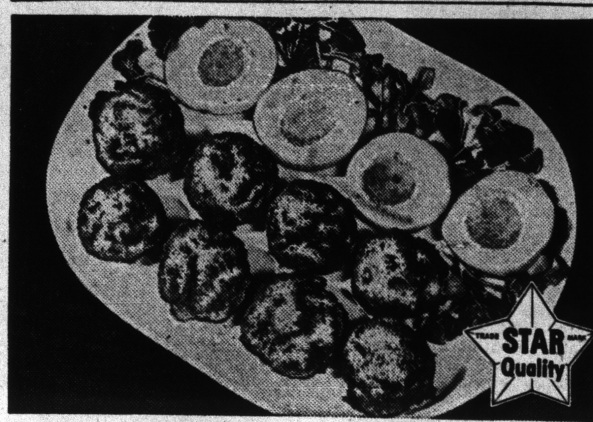
**POLICE GROUP TO MEET**

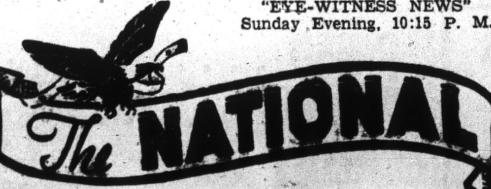
