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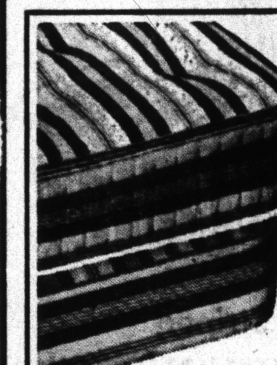
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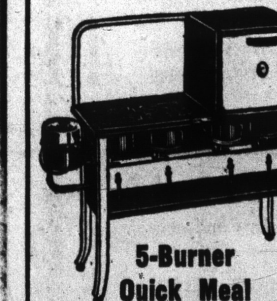
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Utah Polygamists Find Tax, Ration Problems No Worry

SALT LAKE CITY, March 23 (U. P.).—Problems of Utah polygamists are numerous. Fundamentalists Leader Joseph W. Musser said today in an exclusive interview with United Press, but rationing and income tax worries are not among them.

Musser explained that a Fundamentalist—with anywhere from two to six wives and 12 to 33 children—would have a hard time making enough money in a year to "entitle him to pay income tax." Although exemptions were not listed for more than one wife, he said, a \$350 exemption per child amounts to a tidy sum for a father of a plural family.

As to rationing, it is common knowledge that one ration book for one person never goes as far as 20 books for 20.

Work in Factories
The Fundamentalists named in the government Mann and Lindbergh law indictments alone have more than 30 sons and at least one daughter—Musser's serving in the armed forces.

Trial of nine of the group ended yesterday with Federal Judge T. Blake Kennedy setting May 12 as the deadline for filing briefs. The defendants admitted practicing polygamy but attacked the government's authority to prosecute them.

Although women generally are taught by the sect that their place is in the home, Musser reported that about 30 per cent of the Fundamentalists' plural wives have been working in Utah defense plants and on other war projects. Working spouses who might be forced to stay home were they monogamists simply leave their children in the care of their co-wives.

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4TH WARPLANE AT LOCAL SHOW

Open Exhibit Tomorrow to Honor Memory of H. Weir Cook.

A fourth complete airplane, the P-39 Airacobra made by Bell Aircraft Corp., Buffalo, N. Y., will be added to the exhibit opening tomorrow night at the World War Memorial plaza in connection with the ceremonies honoring the memory of Col. H. Weir Cook.

CHURCHILL TO TALK OVER RADIO SUNDAY

PLYLE BILL SPONSOR IS CONGRATULATED

WASHINGTON, March 23.—Six U. S. soldiers with the 5th army in Italy think so well of Ernie Pyle's suggestion of "fight pay" for men in actual combat that they cable congratulations to Rep. Samuel A. Weiss (D. Pa.), sponsor of a bill to include the proposal in the military pay law.

"Congratulations on Ernie Pyle bill you introduced," the cable said. "It's not the money but the recognition of fighting pay for fighting men."

Signers included Lt. Ed. Bailey and Pfc. Michael Chernicky, of McKeesport, Pa.; Pfc. Ark Gressler, of Norristown, Pa.; Cpl. David Lieber-

man, Brooklyn, N. Y.; Pvt. John Finelson and Cpl. Arthur Carr, whose home addresses were not given.

Mr. Weiss' bill would give members of the armed forces in combat 50 per cent extra pay as given flying men in the army air forces. It also would give extra pay at the same rate for those who make regular and frequent plane flights.
