

MEAT PLATTERS 'STACKED HIGH'

OPA Expects Record Output

In 1944; Ham Ration To Rise.

WASHINGTON, March 29 (U.P.)—The nation's meat platters were stacked close to an all-time high during the first year of rationing and are scheduled to go even higher in 1944. Price Chief Chester Bowles said today on the anniversary of the red stamp rationing program.

Despite an anticipated record meat production this year, however, Bowles said there was "little possibility" that rationing restrictions would be lifted. He estimated that butter will be rationed at the rate of one pound per person a month during 1944.

The red stamp rationing program includes meats, butter, fats, oils, cheeses and other dairy products.

Consumption at high

"Odd as it may seem," Bowles said, "total consumption of meat during the first year of rationing was at one of the highest levels in the country's history . . . with the exception of the three-year period of 1940-1942, this is the highest civilian meat consumption since 1928."

Rationing was necessitated, he explained, by the "tremendous increase" in the buying power of war-prosperous civilians and because the consumption of meat "has always been closely related to income."

The 25,000,000,000 pounds of meat which farmers will produce this year will mean that each consumer will have a 132-pound share. Of the total supply 8,000,000,000 pounds is earmarked for military and lend-lease requirements.

Give Ham Values

If rationing were abandoned, Bowles said, demand for meat would jump to between 180 and 170 pounds per person per year—more than could be met even under the anticipated record production.

The O.P.A., meanwhile, announced April ham point values so dealers can get ready for Easter sales. Ready-to-eat hams will be one point less next month than they were in March. Fresh and cured hams will remain unchanged.

Dry-cured hams, such as Virginia cured, southern cured, and country cured, will have a ration value in April only one point above the fresh hams from which they are prepared instead of a two-point differential as in March.

Other April point values for meats, fats and cheese will be announced Friday, O.P.A. said.
