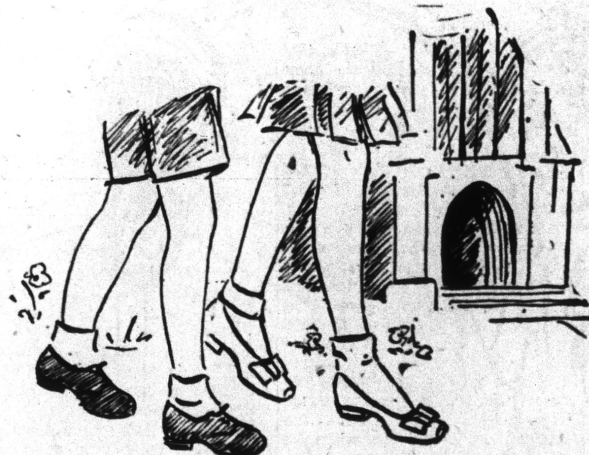
The clinic is designed to illustrate the therapeutic values of music and to launch a music "bank" project adopted by the national organization.

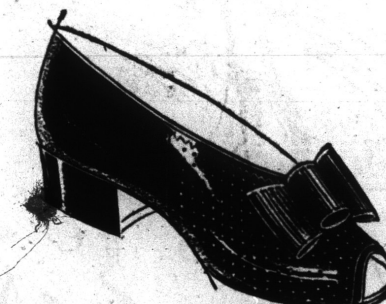
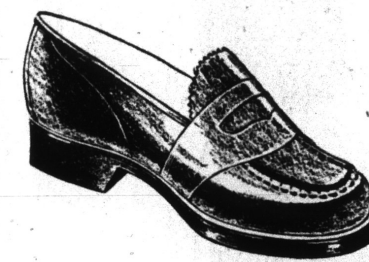

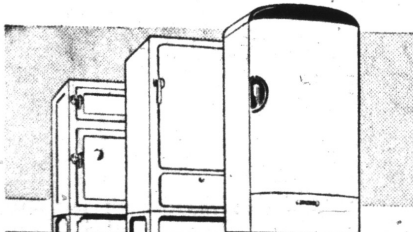
