BLOOMINGTON, Ind., March 31.—Frank (Red) Kane, an Indianapolis hockey player, who is described as a lefthanded first baseman, signed in at the Indianapolis Indians' training camp today. He played semi-pro ball in Canada last year and will receive a thorough tryout.

The Indians could use a capable first sacker. They have been trying to buy an experienced man in order to release Ed Morgan for outfield duty but so far all clubs contacted demanded players in return.

In the event that Kane fills the bill the Tribesmen will be much better off than the situation appears at the moment. He is 21, stands 5 feet 11 inches and weighs 185. He has a 4-F draft classification.

Jack Favored Over Zurita

NEW YORK, March 31 (U. P.).—It's "Meat Ticket" vs. "Hot Tangle" at Madison Square garden tonight as brown-skinned Beau Jack, Mike Jacobs' million-dollar drawing card, attempts to ruin the New York debut of Mexico's Juan Zurita, brand new lightweight champion.

Beau Jack, fighting his 13th Garden main event, was a 3-1 favorite to beat the Mexican switch-hitter in their 10-round non-title bout.

Zurita, the stocky-bodied but long-faced speed merchant who wrested the National Boxing association's version of the lightweight crown from Sammy Angott at Los Angeles, March 8, has more backers than the lopsided odds would indicate. Many experts believe that his unorthodox style will achieve victory—if he doesn't get knocked out in an early round.

The fans—curious about Zurita's ability and confident of slam-bang action from Beau—are expected to attend 17,000 strong and to provide a gate of more than \$90,000. Beau already has attracted a total of \$947,477 for 12 garden main events.

Tonight's gross will send him well over the million-dollar mark. With Sgt. Joe Louis in the army, Beau—former lightweight king—has become Mike Jacobs' meat ticket.

Billy Holm, the Bruins' No. 1 catcher, revealed he had been reclassified 1-A.

LAFAYETTE, Ind.—Jim Devlin began working out as a member of the Cleveland Indians' coaching staff. It was the 21-year-old rookie's second appearance at the camp, having refused the first terms offered by the club.

BALTIMORE, Md.—Colds and coughs forced light workouts on the Boston Red Sox today and drew another "beef" from Manager Joe Cronin regarding northern training facilities. The team is scheduled to meet the Curtis Bay coast guard team tomorrow.

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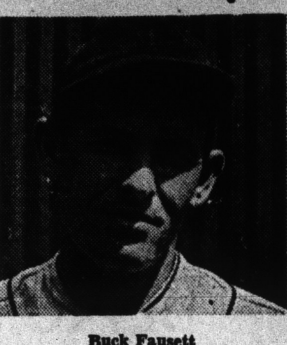
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Fausett Returns to Victory Field to Play With Reds

Cup Series Scheduled
MONTREAL, March 31 (U. P.).—Red Dutton, managing director of the National Hockey league, said today that the Stanley cup final round play-off between the Montreal Canadiens and the Chicago Black Hawks will open here Tuesday.

The series then will switch to Chicago the following Thursday and Sunday and the remainder of the games probably will be played here, since no ice is available in Chicago after April 9.

The first two games and closing with a seven goal rush, the Canadiens recorded one of the most lopsided victories in the history of post-season play.

Ray Getliffe, Maurice Richard Chamberlain and Toe Blake paced the winners with two goals apiece. At Detroit the Black Hawks eliminated the Red Wings from further competition with a 5-2 triumph in the fifth game of their series. NEW YORK, March 31 (U. P.).—Utah university's stringing gun, overlooked after they bowed to Kentucky in the opening round of the national invitation tournament, ruled today as mythical basketball champions of the nation by virtue of a 43-36 victory over St. John's last night before 18,125 at Madison Square garden.
