

# HUNGARY TOLD TO RESIST FOE

Secret Radio Asks People To Sabotage Enemy Food Transports.

BERN, March 31.—Lessons in the art of sabotage and passive and active resistance are being broadcast daily to the Hungarian people by the clandestine radio Kossuth.

It is too early to tell how far the Hungarians will be able to match up to other occupied countries in their resistance to and sabotage of the enemy but these broadcasts are the first sign of opposition to the invading Wehrmacht.

Radio Kossuth broadcast the following admonition to the people of Hungary:

"If the Hungarians do not wish to die of hunger, they must sabotage food transports to the Reich."

"Derail and telescope trains, tamper with switches, fail to give signals, loosen screws and drop axle-grease anywhere but on axles," railwaymen were urged.

Radio Kossuth revealed addresses of various headquarters of the German authorities, even disclosing that the gestapo GHQ was the Hotel Gellert in Budapest.

The fact that the gestapo has tried to keep its headquarters secret seems proof that the Nazi police are hardly being welcomed by the Hungarians as honored guests.

# GOP LEAGUERS HEAR CAPEHART

U. S. Senatorial Candidate Stresses Return to Private Enterprise.

The issue to be decided by voters in the November election is whether the American economy will consist of government jobs at government pay or a return to private enterprise, Homer E. Capehart, candidate for the Republican senatorial nomination, said last night.

He spoke to members of the Republican Victory league, organization formed several years ago, at a dinner meeting in the Canary College.

"Government jobs at government wages at the expense of the people cannot produce a sound, lasting economy," Mr. Capehart said. "The job can be done only by sound planning and wise counsel on the part of industry, labor and agriculture. It cannot be done by New Deal theorists who believe that public debt is a benefit to the people."

"If private enterprise does not provide the jobs, then the government will do it, through FWA, WPA, and all the other alphabetical formulas that prevailed prior to the war."

Mr. Capehart urged the Republicans to give united support to the new state chairman, John Lauer.

Glen L. Campbell, printing company owner, today joined the ranks of those seeking the Republican nomination for state representative in the coming primary.

Mr. Campbell, 42, was born in Alicia, Ark., moved here in 1916 and was graduated from Manual high school in 1919. He has been connected with the printing industry in Indianapolis since leaving high school and has operated his own plant since 1929.

He has served as secretary and president of the Indianapolis Lions club and as district governor of that organization. He is a member of Indianapolis lodge No. 669, F. and A. F., the Optimist club, the Methodist church, the Indianapolis Typothetae and the Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce.

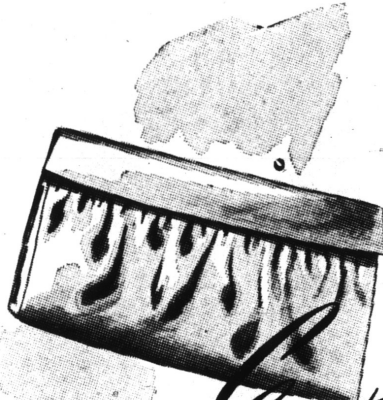
