

Reveals Church of England Approves Bombing

NEW YORK, April 7 (U. P.).—Church leaders here on their relations with the Church of England approves the bombing of enemy territory as a means of shortening the war and its suffering, the Most Rev. Cyril Forster Garbett, archbishop of York, England, told a press conference today.

The archbishop said that the Church of England was in support of anything which would hasten the end of the war.

He arrived in the United States yesterday for a month's tour of this country and Canada, during which he will confer with Episcopal leaders here on their relations with the Church of England.

The archbishop recently visited Russia on a similar mission to the Russian orthodox church, which he said was closer to the Church of England than the Roman Catholic church. The Church of England, he said, expected increasing cooperation with the Russian church.

Asked his views on the Palestine question, the archbishop said that he could see no clear cut solution. It was a question of both justice to the Jews, with whom he said he was in complete sympathy, and justice to the Arabs, who consider Palestine their homeland.

The archbishop, here at the invitation of Presiding Bishop Henry St. George Tucker of the Protestant Episcopal church, will broadcast from Washington tomorrow and will make his first public appearance in the pulpit of the Episcopal cathedral at St. Peter and St. Paul in Washington on April 16.

NEW ATTERBURY HOSPITAL READY

Soldier Patients From Palm Beach to Be Transferred.

CAMP ATTERBURY, Ind., April 7.—Following activation this week of the 2000-bed station hospital as an army general hospital, Camp Atterbury officials announced today that an undetermined number of soldier patients at the Ream general hospital, Palm Beach, Fla., will be transferred here.

The Ream hospital is being discontinued and some of the hospital officers also will be assigned to Atterbury.

With the activation of the general hospital, the 3547th service unit came into existence. The medical center, commanded by Col. H. L. Conner, will provide treatment for soldiers returned from overseas as well as personnel stationed here.

Gets New Equipment

Conversion of the hospital calls for additional therapeutic equipment for specialized treatment and specialists in neuro, plastic and orthopedic surgery, Col. Conner said.

Civilian employees will be retained in the change-over. WAC section II, 1560th service unit has been inactivated, and a large part of the personnel of medical section, 1560th service unit, have been transferred to the new 3547th service unit.

The center will be known as "U. S. Army General Hospital" until an official name is designated.
