Weimer to Describe South American Trip in Friday Talk.

Charles Perry Weimer, photographer, lecturer, writer and explorer, will uncover 100,000 miles of South America in the words and pictures of his illustrated lecture at 8:15 Friday at Caleb Mills hall, Shortridge high school.



Presented by the Federation of Indianapolis public school teachers, Mr. Weimer will show a panoramic technical film taken during his 100,000 mile tour by boat, canoe, train, plane, horse, oxen, automobile and foot-power.

A native of Elkins, W. Va., Mr. Weimer studied at the University of Pittsburgh, the Carnegie Institute of Technology, and the Art Institute of Pittsburgh.

Mrs. Laura Wadsworth, chairman of the program committee, will introduce Mr. Weimer. A musical program by a girls' choir and an instrumental trio from Technical high school will precede the lecture.

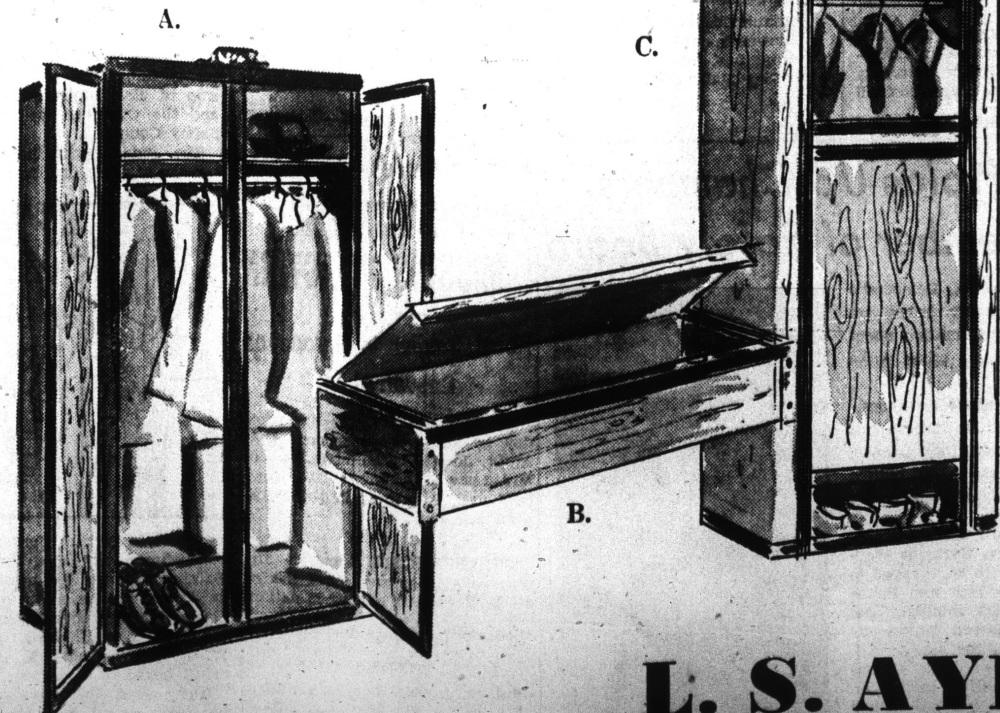
