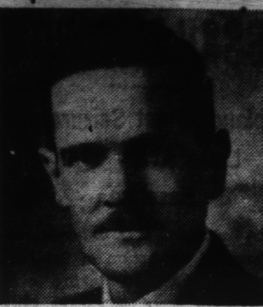

DIRECTLY TO RUSSWASHINGTON, May 3 (U. P.).—
American planes have been flown
directly to Russia during the past
two years over a northern route—
presumably via Alaska and Siberia
—saving time and avoiding losses
incurred in enemy U-boat attacks
on plane-carrying convoys, the war
department revealed last night.The planes, made available to
Russia under lend-lease, were flown
by Russian air force pilots, the depart-
ment said.This time and plane saving
achievement was revealed in a
citation to Maj. Gen. Follett Brad-
ley, Garden City, N. Y., who was
credited with effecting the arrange-
ment with Soviet authorities "de-
spite many obstacles."Bradley received the distinguished
service medal for his successful
efforts. The decoration was awarded
him here two days ago by Lt. Gen.
Joseph T. McNarney, deputy chief
of staff, but the citation itself was
made public only last night.AUSTRALIA STUDIES
ARMISTICE TERMSLONDON, May 3 (U. P.).—
Australian and New Zealand min-
isters were reported today to have
raised the question of armistice
terms with Japan after it was re-
vealed that the dominion prime
ministers conference had discussed
general terms that could be im-
posed upon Germany.It was emphasized that the talks
were exploratory only and that any
discussions of a positive nature ob-
viously must be conducted with the
other united nations, particularly
the United States, Russia and China.Prime Minister Winston Churchill,
it was announced today, told the
opening session of the conference
Monday that the ministers were
"meeting in the deadliest climax of
the conflict." He termed the con-
ference "undoubtedly one of the
most important events that has
taken place since the start of the

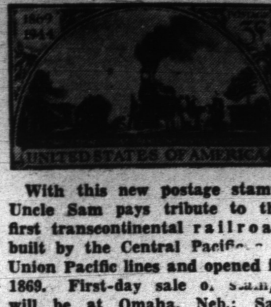

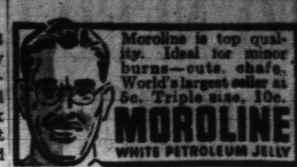

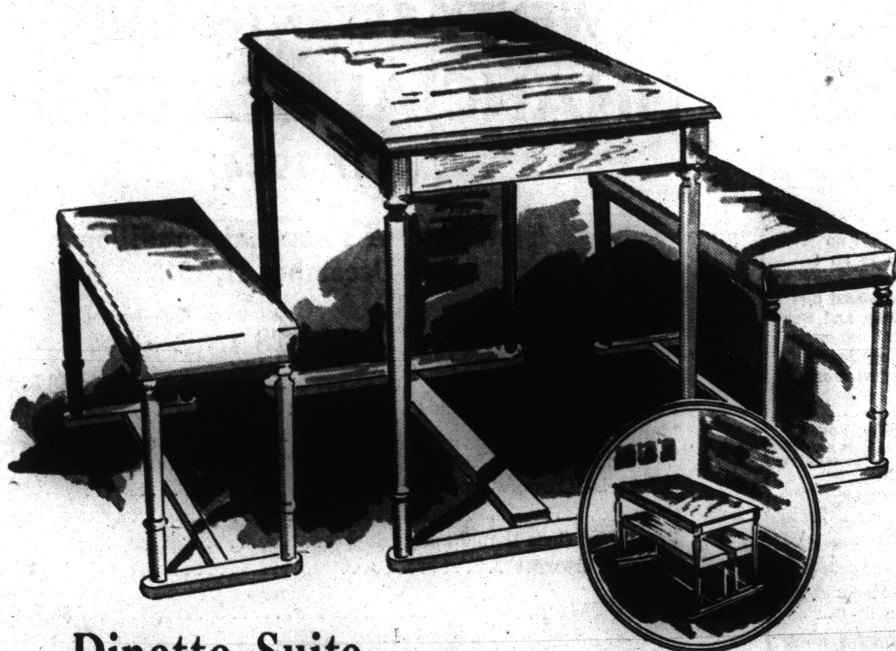
