

## ALLIES OCCUPY ITALY SALIENT

Germans Forced to Flee From 200 Square Mile Area.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Naples, May 10 (U. P.).—Allied troops fanned out along the lower rim of the Mafella Plateau on the Central Italian front today, moving swiftly and apparently without opposition to complete the occupation of the 200-square-mile salient abandoned by the Germans.

Moving up along a front of more than 20 miles between the Nazi-held positions as Castel di Sangro and Casoli, allied advance guards raced northward through enemy demolitions to seize a number of high points inside the evacuated salient.

One allied spearhead occupied Palena, on the south bank of the Aventino river, while other units swept into Gambellara, seven miles to the east, and Fallascosa, six miles east of Palena.

American medium bombers resumed their attacks on German communications lines in central Italy yesterday after a four-day lull imposed by bad weather. Allied fighters and fighter-bombers also hammered targets along the Rome-Florence line as well as highway traffic and supply dumps in the battle areas.

R. A. F. Spitfires again hit enemy installations in Yugoslavia, bombing and stopping a German troop camp and coastal highway transport.

British Wellingtons followed up the daylight assaults with a seven-hour night attack on Genoa and Livorno harbors, setting big fires throughout the target areas and damaging a number of important dock installations.

Eight allied planes were lost in all operations.

### ALMOST LOSES EAR AS CAR IS RAMMED

### CALLS FOR AID TO CHINA

CHUNGKING, May 10 (U. P.).—A Chinese government spokesman, citing sacrifices of Chinese soldiers and civilians, said today that it was "high time that the allies should call a halt to their suffering by helping us win the war sooner through an increased supply of armaments."

## MAN TWICE 'DEAD' DIES AGAIN--REALLY

HAMMOND, Ind., May 10 (U. P.).—The man who came back to life twice finally has been defeated by death.

Mrs. Arthur Lance revealed today that her husband died of blood poisoning a week ago and has been buried at Clinton, Ind. She said that because of publicity attendant upon his two previous "resurrections" she had said nothing about his fatal illness.

Lance, 48, first was "killed" eight years ago when struck by an automobile. He was taken to an undertaker, who noted signs of life. Lance recovered fully after four years.

Last December he became ill after a meal and a fireman's resuscitator squad and physician could find no sign of life. Again he recovered.

Mrs. Lance said today that Lance was fatally stricken by blood poisoning April 30 and died in an East Chicago hospital the next day.

## Bricker Wins More Than 50 Delegates as 2 States Vote

Former U. S. Senator Rush D. Holt, attempting a political comeback in West Virginia, trailed by nearly 3 to 1 in the Democratic gubernatorial primary, while in Ohio mayors of the state's two largest cities led their respective tickets for nomination for governor, incomplete returns from yesterday's primaries showed today.

In addition, West Virginia Democrats selected 18 delegates to the national nominating convention, unpledged but reportedly favoring a fourth term for President Roosevelt, and Republicans named 19 delegates, divided between Gov. Thomas H. Dewey of New York and Gov. John W. Bricker of Ohio.

### Rush Holt Trailing

Ohio Democrats selected 52 delegates, nominally pledged to State Auditor Joseph T. Ferguson, but who actually will back Mr. Roosevelt. Fifty Republican delegates named will back Bricker.

In the West Virginia gubernatorial race, returns from 590 of the state's 2796 precincts gave:

Democratic: Circuit Judge Clarence Meadows, 28,064; Holt, 10,368. Republican: Mayor D. Boone Dawson, Charleston, 16,210; R. J. Funk-

houser, millionaire industrialist, 13,568.

### Returns in Ohio

In Ohio, 7161 of the state's 3872 precincts gave: Republican: Mayor James Garfield Stewart of Cincinnati, 130,254; Thomas J. Herbert, 111,117; Paul Herbert, 103,704. Democratic: Mayor Frank J. Lausche of Cleveland, 114,495; Martin L. Sweeney, 49,179; James W. Huffman, 30,797. In the two primaries President Roosevelt picked up 70 delegates. He is expected to pick up 66 more this week, and they will be enough to give him an actual convention majority.

A Wyoming Democratic delegation of 16, selected Monday night in convention at Casper, will support Mr. Roosevelt. Texas Democrats met in county conventions yesterday, but the state convention will not be held until May 23.

### Taft Unopposed

Bricker, with 50 certain votes is the favorite son from Ohio, and an undetermined number from West Virginia is in second place in the campaign for the Republican presidential nomination behind Dewey, who although still an unwavering

## DAVISON GETS BACK JOB AS PROSECUTOR

HOLLS G. Davison of Frankfort, back at his desk as Clinton county prosecutor after receiving a medical discharge from the army, today was the first prosecuting attorney to be reappointed by Governor Schricker.

The governor, who has accepted 30 prosecutor resignations since he became the state's chief executive, reappointed Davison yesterday. Since Nov. 12, 1943, when Davison resigned, the office had been in charge of William Robison Jr., and William Robison Sr., both of Frankfort. The younger Robison subsequently entered the armed services and Schricker appointed his father.
