

NURSES' HOME WILL GET WING

Federal Grant Paves Way For \$220,000 Addition To I. U. Building.

Construction will be underway soon on a \$220,000 wing to the Ball nurses' residence on the campus of the Indiana university hospitals here.

The construction was made possible by President Roosevelt's approval yesterday of a federal works agency grant of \$135,101 to apply on the total cost. Approximately \$50,000 of the university's share has been obtained by subscription.

Preliminary plans and blueprints have been drawn, full wartime priorities have been obtained, and construction will begin as soon as the school trustees approve the final plans.

To Accommodate 300

University officials announced that the new building would provide facilities for approximately 300 nurses. There are about 220 on the campus now.

The building will be a permanent addition to the \$500,000 Ball residence, originally a gift of the Ball brothers of Muncie. The wing, while accommodating the additional nursing trainees during the war, will have long-range value in that it will house graduate nurses as well as trainees afterwards.

The building will be the sole property of the university, with no strings attached because of the federal grant. Negotiations in Washington were carried on by the late Senator Frederick Van Nuys, by his successor, Senator Samuel D. Jackson, and by Rep. Louis Ludlow.

City-Wide Memorial Day Exercises Begin Sunday

Memorial day exercises honoring the fallen heroes of America's wars will begin Sunday with 15 services throughout the city.

The first of the week-end ceremonies was held at 7:30 o'clock last night in University park at the Harrison and Lincoln statues, under auspices of the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War. Mrs. E. C. Rumpel spoke.

The annual Memorial day parade Tuesday will begin at 9:30 a. m. and will be led by a police escort followed in order by the Scout field air base band under Bandmaster Kirkpatrick, chief warrant officer; Grand Marshal Andrew Alburts and Chief of Staff Dave Carlu. The order of march follows:

First Division—C. M. Barkdale, marshal; Bud Nisley, assistant; Indianapolis News Newboys' band, G. A. R. and auxiliaries, and Sons of Union Veterans.

Second Division—L. V. King, marshal; United Spanish War Veterans, Military Order of the Purple Heart, V. F. W. and auxiliaries, Sons of V. F. W. and Jewish War Veterans.

Third Division—Willard Thomas, marshal; Disabled American Veterans, American Veterans, American Legion and auxiliaries.

Fourth Division—Manford Mead, marshal; War Mothers, Service Star Legion, Mothers of WAVES, Indianapolis unit of the Marine Corps League auxiliary, Camp Fire Girls, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Parents of Sons in Service, Inc., and American War Dads.

Formation of Parade The parade will form as follows: Grand marshal and chief of staff, Pennsylvania and North st.; first division, south side of E. North st. west of Pennsylvania st.; second division, north side of E. North st. west of Pennsylvania st.; third division, Memorial plaza bordering Pennsylvania st.; fourth division, south side of E. Michigan st. west of Pennsylvania st., right resting on Pennsylvania st.

The line of march is: South on Pennsylvania st. to Washington st., west to Meridian st., north to the Circle, around east and disbanding on the north steps of the monument. All units should be in their assigned location by 9:15 a. m. Ralph R. Martin is chairman of the parade committee.

Immediately following the parade, services will be held at the monument under the auspices of the Marion county council, V. F. W. Leon V. King Sr. is vice department commander.

Will Sing "America" Mr. Alburts, commander, will act as master of ceremonies. The program will include:

"America" by the Indianapolis News Newboys' band with singing led by Minnie Griebelbauer; invocation by the Rev. Raymond G. Hockstra; reading of "Logan's General Order No. 11" by Albert Chew, Marion county council quartermaster; V. F. W. memorial services by the Marion county council and auxiliary officers; address by the Rev. Mr. Hockstra; V. F. W. memorial song, "Sleep, Soldier Boy, Sleep"; salute to the dead by the V. F. W. firing squad; and the playing of taps by Frank Delatore, commander of Post 824.

Two services will precede the annual parade on Memorial day Tuesday. The Spanish-American war veterans will hold services in Garfield park at the statue of Maj. Gen. Henry W. Lawton at 8:30 a. m. Also at 8:30 monument decorations will be placed at the four statues of the Indiana Soldiers and Sailors' monument on the Circle.

Daughters of the Union, Woman's Relief corps and Sons of Veterans auxiliary will decorate the Oliver Perry Morton statue; American War Mothers, Service Star Legion and the American Legion auxiliary will decorate the statue of James Whitcomb; Spanish War Veterans

auxiliary, Veterans of Foreign Wars auxiliary and the Woman's Relief corps will decorate the statue of William H. Harrison; and the Daughters of the American Revolution, Daughters of Union Veterans and Ladies of the Grand Army will decorate the statue of George Rogers Clark.
