

TWO CRITICALLY HURT IN TRAFFIC

Motorist Arrested Here; State Holiday Deaths Mount to 12.

Two persons were critically injured here yesterday in traffic accidents and three deaths over the state brought the state holiday accidental death total to 12.

Mrs. Marie Buck, 31, of 112 E. St. Clair st., was struck last night as she stood near the curb at 10th st. and Keystone ave. by a car driven by Francis Northern, 26, 1315 Polk st., police said. Thrown against a lamp post, Mrs. Buck's left leg was almost severed, her right leg was fractured and she sustained head injuries. Northern, a discharged veteran of this war, was arrested and charged by police with operating under the influence of liquor, reckless driving and driving without a permit.

Delbert Rippy, 21, 318 E. Morris st., suffered a skull fracture when he was struck by a trackless trolley

near the corner of Oliver and Birch aves. No arrests were made. Mrs. Harold Imhoff was killed at Anderson when struck by a train. Catherine Clements died as a result of a traffic accident at Bedford, and Elmer A. Pelasek was fatally injured when hit by a train at Hammond. All fatalities occurred yesterday.

National Toll 218

The nation's accidental death toll for the first three days of the long holiday week-end stood at 218 today. Since Friday midnight, 97 persons have died in traffic accidents, 62 have been drowned and 59 have lost their lives in other accidents.
