**SCHOOLS MAY OPEN LATER AS CROP AID**

Indiana rural school children took a look at the brighter side of life today after an announcement by the state office of public instruction that rural schools may open later than usual this fall.

Clement T. Malan, state superintendent, said that the rural schools would adjust opening dates to conform to harvest dates of perishable crops.

Malan called six regional meetings for school officials and agricultural agents of 44 counties to discuss proper co-ordination of the proposed plan to permit the children to harvest the crops.

Approximately 94,000 acres of tomatoes, 50,000 acres of sweet corn, 12,000 acres of lima beans, 11,000 acres of green beans and 8,000 acres of potatoes were listed by Malan as having a definite bearing on opening school dates.

**'2-MAN ARMY' BAGS 36 NAZIS 'ON SIDE'**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (U. P.). Two staff sergeants, doing "a job of reconnaissance with slaughter on the side," killed, wounded or captured 26 German soldiers, silenced two machineguns and rescued two comrades in three action-packed days during the American drive on Cassino, the war department revealed yesterday.

On one occasion the scouts, Charles R. Johnson of Clayville, Ga., and Harold D. Wilson, Little Hocking, O., ran into 20 advancing Germans. Without waiting for reinforcements, they opened fire, killing five and forcing the rest to flee. During the action their rifles became so hot they had to wear gloves to continue firing them.

**FARM MACHINERY BEHIND SCHEDULE**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (U. P.). —Production Chief Donald M. Nelson disclosed yesterday that the farm machinery production program ended the fiscal year on June 30 11.3 per cent behind schedule despite an all-year high in production for June.

June production totaled \$65,677,371, exceeding May production by \$4,530,357.

Programs lagging on June 30 included harvesting machinery, 28.5 per cent; haying machinery, 19.6 per cent; barn and barnyard equipment, 21 per cent; sprayers, dusters and orchard heaters, 11.6 per cent; planting, seeding and fertilizer machinery, 5.5 per cent.

**PLANE CRASH KILLS ADMIRAL IN PACIFIC**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (U. P.). —Rear Adm. Charles F. Cecil, commander of the cruiser Helena when it was sunk in the Kula gulf naval battle, was killed Monday when his plane crashed in taking off from a Pacific base, the navy revealed yesterday.

The 50-year-old officer, eighth flag admiral killed during the war, held an undisclosed assignment in the Pacific at the time of his death.

**DOROTHY DIX HURT IN TRAFFIC ACCIDENT**

ASHEVILLE, N. C., Aug. 2 (U. P.). —Dorothy Dix, 82, one of the nation's best-known advisers to the love-lorn, was resting today in an Asheville hospital after what her physician and brother termed a "miraculous escape" from death beneath the wheels of a city bus. She is known in private life as Mrs. Elizabeth Meriweather Gilmer.
