## SCHOOLS MAY OPEN LATER AS CROP AID

Indiana rural school children took a look at the brighter side of life today after an announcement by the state office of public instruction that rural schools may open later than usual this fall.

Clement T. Malan, state superintendent, said that the rural schools would adjust opening dates to conform to harvest dates of perishable crops.

Malan called six regional meetings for school officials and agricultural agents of 44 counties to discuss proper co-ordination of the proposed plan to permit the children to harvest the crops.

Approximately 94,000 acres of tomatoes, 50,000 acres of sweet corn, 12,000 acres of lima beans, 11,000 acres of green beans and 8000 acres of potatoes were listed by Malan as having a definite bearing on opening school dates.
