

OPTIMISTS TO HEAR
JAMES STRICKLAND

James D. Strickland, OPA state director, will speak on "The OPA and How It Operates," to the Indianapolis Optimist club at 12:15 p. m. tomorrow in the Columbia club.

On Aug. 16, members of the club will visit the Salvation army fresh air camp.

The Anderson Optimist club will be guests of the local club for the August golf tournament, Aug. 17 at the Indianapolis Country club.

New stories of yesterday's kings and planters, today's fighters and workers, and the world's lakes and cities soon will take their places on the nation's bookshelves.

For these are among the forthcoming volumes on the Bobbs-Merrill Co.'s fall book list, which includes three young people's books by Indianapolis authors.

The "best sellers" of the adult list are expected to be Inglis Fletcher's "Lusty Wind for Carolina," the third and last of her series

about early Carolina planters; the geographical volumes on "Lake Michigan" and "Lake Superior" in the American lakes series, and Edgar Maas' "The Dream of Philip II," a biography of the Spanish king and a picture of his age.

In the juvenile division the leaders are expected to be "August Flies," another in the series of Augustus adventures by Le Grand, and "Future Perfect" by Bernice Bryant, an etiquette book for the bobby sox age.

"Lusty Wind for Carolina" will be published in October. The new lake books went on sale this week. "The Dream of Philip II" will come out in September, the etiquette book in September, and the Augustus story in October.

Indianapolis writers are represented in The Childhood of Famous American series. The books are "George Carver: Boy Scientist" by Augusta Stevenson; "Stephen Foster: Boy Minstrel" by Helen Boyd Higgins, and "Jane Addams: Little

Lame Girl" by Jean Brown Wagoner. Other new volumes on the adult list are:

"The Second Navy Reader" and "The Air Forces Reader," anthologies of the best articles about America's fighting men and their services.

"Fair Fantastic Paris" by Harold Etlinger, a story of happy pre-war Paris as seen by an American. Biographies of "Joseph Lister, Father of Modern Surgery" by

Rhoda Truax; "John C. Calhoun, Nationalist" by Charles M. Wilke, and two Civil war generals, "Fighting Joe Hooker" by Walter H. Herbert, and "First With the Most" by Robert S. Henry.

"Guerrilla" by Lord Dunsany, an allegory of German occupation and oppression.

"The Devastator" by Arthur Stringer, a short romantic novel. "Mother Went Mad on Monday" by Ethel Hueston, a novel of family life which David Laurence

Chambers, Bobbs-Merrill president, calls "her best book."

"Royal Street" by W. Adolphe Roberts, a novel of old New Orleans.

"Sun in Their Eyes" by Monte Barrett, a historical novel of the period when Americans first surged into Texas. The author is the creator of the Jane Arden comic strip.

To round out the selection the publishers are presenting an enlarged and revised edition of their perennial best seller, "The Joy of Cooking" by Irma S. Rombauer.

The children's list includes: "Too Much Salt and Pepper," a story of porcupines by nature lecturer Sam Campbell.

"The Mysterious Continent" by Charlotte Lohse and Judith Seaton, an account of the adventurous discovery of the South Pacific islands.

"Mount Delightful" by Eleanor Youmans, the story of a girl and her dog.

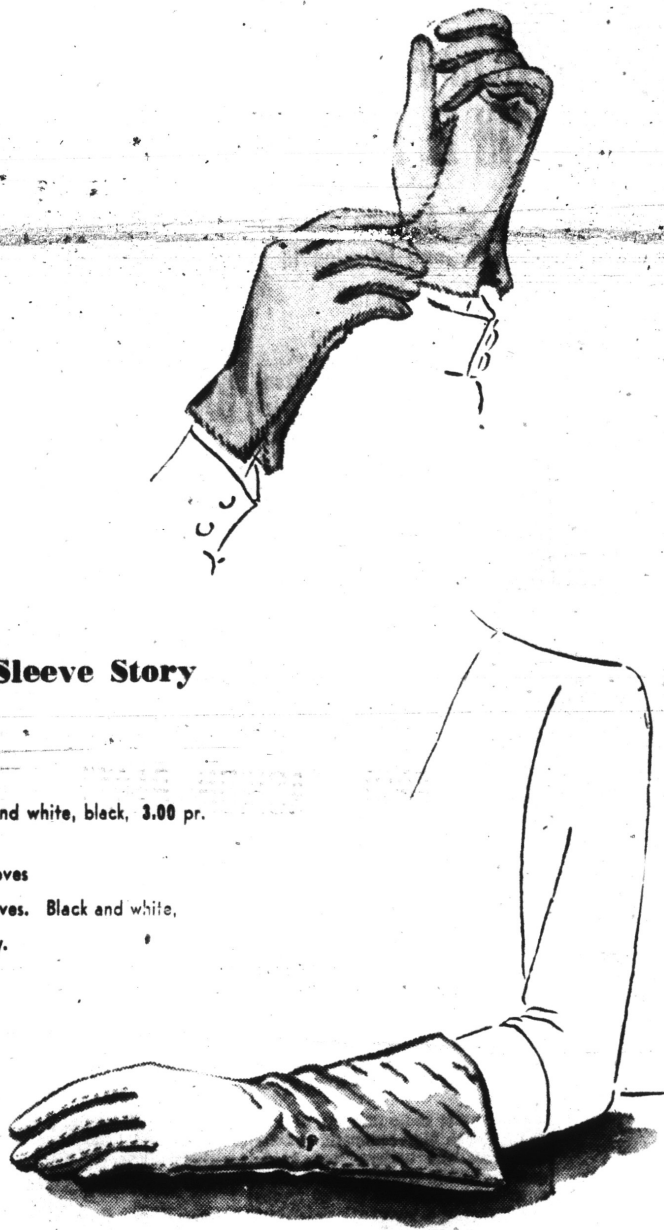
