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Dr. Zorn, 'Melting Pot Pastor', To Note Golden Anniversary Here Sunday

Dr. Hans Manthey Zorn, nationally known Lutheran pastor, who has done his bit for America's melting pot, will be honored on the golden anniversary of his ministry Sept. 10 at services and a dinner.

Dr. Zorn has been the pastor of St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran church (Missouri synod) since 1923. Both here, and in the Ohio pastorate which he served for 28 years, Dr. Zorn substituted English services for those conducted in German. Thus he helped the German parishioners to become integrated with American life.

Dr. Zorn was born in India, where his parents were missionaries. Two sons are also missionaries to India. They are the Rev. Robert M. Zorn, and the Rev. Kurt M. Zorn, the latter on leave assisting his father in the church.

First-Hand Knowledge

Knowledge gained by travel in the holy land and from study of the original Hebrew text of the Old Testament provide source material for many of Dr. Zorn's sermons. These have won him fame over the nation.

The most brilliant social occasion is said to be of little interest to him. But if one of his "flock" falls ill or suffers bereavement, Dr. Zorn is all eagerness to be at his side.

The comforting words which pour from him then, described as inspired, are held in remembrance by the membership.

Mrs. Zorn died in 1937. She is recalled as "the gracious, diplomatic minister's wife" who presided over his home, was of inestimable value in the church and still found time to be the mother of eight children.

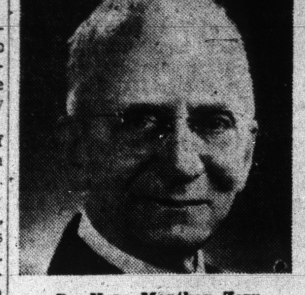

In addition to the two missionaries, another son is in the ministry—the Rev. Carl M. Zorn of New Jersey. Miss Marie Zorn is a pianist on the Jordan conservatory faculty. Two other daughters, Mrs. H. C. Fahrback and Mrs. Louis Brunko, also live here. Another son, Paul, is a Milwaukee businessman and a daughter, Mrs. A. J. Kuhlman, also lives in Milwaukee.

Dr. Zorn was reared in Cleveland, where his parents moved after leaving India. He was graduated from Concordia college, Ft. Wayne, Ind., and Concordia seminary, St. Louis. He translated into English a shelf of religious books written in German by his father and represented his denomination's foreign missions board on an inspection of the India missions in 1930.

During his administration of St. Paul's church, a new school and recreation building has been erected at the cost of about \$90,000. Dr. Zorn presided over St. Paul's centennial celebration in 1942, when \$20,000 was spent on improvements. He marks his 50th anniversary on church property entirely debt-free.

GASOLINE—Stamps 12 is good for 3 gallons and expires Sept. 21. B3 and C3 and B4 and C4 good for 5 gallons; T (3d quarter) good for 5 gallons through Sept. 30; E, E1 and E2 good for 1 gallon; R, R1 and R2 are good for 5 gallons but are not valid at filling stations, Con-
