## GI and His Trumpet Thaws Hearts of Reims Civilians

REIMS, Sept. 1 (Delayed)—The people of Reims were cold after the Americans came. They stood in the street staring at you from the corners of their eyes and sometimes you almost realized how German soldiers felt walking through the same town.

They were like that all the first day and the second day. The second night something happened to thaw them out—something named Pvt. Bernie Badler of New York City.

The French, after four years without making "whoopie," were gathered in a cafe listening to Frenchman Lou Gammes' band. Then American GI's entered. The same coldness the Americans encountered in the streets was shown by the crowd.

Then this short, grinning Badler jumped up on the band stand and grabbed a saxophone. He signaled the orchestra and began playing "Honey-Suckle Rose."

The fear left the faces of the

French. They began tapping feet to the music, laughing and clapping hands.

Badler, who formerly played with Jerry Wald's orchestra, got hotter and hotter. He played "Stardust" until the French hearts turned over and by the time he reached "The St. Louis Blues" GI's and French girls were dancing all over the place.

Although the girls had not danced since the German occupation they managed somehow to follow jitterbugging partners.

Pvt. Lester Schimming, 28, of Fargo, N. D., who was busy bounding a girl around the dance floor exclaimed:

"She can't talk English and I can't talk French but boy are we having fun."

Hearts, Fight Again

One Frenchman, almost weeping, explained the change:

"Alemande come and everything halft and Frenchmen's hearts were bitter. Americans come and everything changed. The Frenchmen's hearts are light again."

So Bernie Badler played and everyone had a marvelous time.

The French could not quite get over the spectacle of seeing a tank destroyer captain, with shaved head and coveralls, jitterbugging.

They thought it a strange but wonderful way for an officer to behave.

Then the military police came. "You know this town is out of bounds. Scram."

They chased out all the soldiers and made Badler quit playing the saxophone.

But they did not destroy the good will that had been created. The next day the people of Reims smiled at you.

And I heard one or two of them humming "Honeysuckle Rose."
