



on behalf of the supreme court was
issued today as follows:
"It is with a keen sense of loss
and regret that this court is called
upon to record the passing of its
sheriff, Harry E. Toner.

and dependable public servant. His
unfailing courtesy, high ideals, and
deep sense of responsibility en-
deared him to the members of this
tribunal and to his fellow employees.
By diligent effort he qualified him-
self for admission to the bar of this
court and he uniformly deported
himself in a manner that reflected
credit upon the legal profession.
His personal habits and character
were exemplary."


