

125 C. A. P. PLANES GATHER AT REVIEW

More than 1200 civil air patrol personnel and 125 airplanes will participate in the wing maneuvers at Freeman field tomorrow and Sunday, with high-ranking military officers to be spectators.

On hand for the event will be Gen. Robert W. Harper, AAP headquarters, Washington, D. C., and Gen. William D. Olds, commanding officer of the first troop carrier command at Stout field. Other military officers and civilian officials will attend the maneuver.

Lt. Col. Walker W. Winslow, commander of the 52d wing CAP in Indiana, has appointed Capt. D. T. Canfield, commander of the Lafayette squadron, as head of the general staff for the maneuver, with Capt. L. W. Baldwin, Ft. Wayne, second in command.

The maneuver, which will mark the beginning of the fall enlistment campaign, will feature the start of a simulated war between Indiana and Kentucky forces.

Hoosier, Who Dealt Death To 39 Japs, Disappointed

SAIPAN, Marianas Islands—Marine Cpl. Philip L. Givan, Moores Hill, Ind., best known simply as "Zeke," has whittled four new notches into the stock of his rifle, bringing up his total to 39 dead Japanese, before he was downed by enemy machine gun bullets.

Zeke was hit three times before his rifle was silenced. Though barely able to carry his own weight, he managed to drag a lumbering six-foot marine buddy, wounded by grenade fragments, down the slope of a ridge to safety.

The corpsman who treated Zeke kept telling him it would be all right again, but Zeke was beyond cheering up. It was not the three bullet wounds, but something altogether different that had Zeke down.

He mumbled over and again, "I only got four."

Gov. Henry F. Schricker had set aside July 11, 1944, as "Zeke Day" throughout Indiana to do honors to the young Hoosier hero who single-handedly bagged 35 Japs.

All this to-do might have necessitated an extra hat size for most fighting men. But as for Zeke, the hurt of only getting four Japs on Saipan will just have to wear off.


