Drove Cleveland in
1886 Parade.

Last rites will be held at 1:30 p. m. tomorrow at the G. H. Herrmann funeral home, 1505 S. East st., for Jap Willis, one of the last expert horse team drivers, who died yesterday morning at his home, 824 Bradshaw st.

Rev. Norman H. Schultz, pastor of Garfield Park Evangelical and Reformed church, will officiate and burial will be in Round Hill cemetery.

A native of Fountaintown, Shelby county, he had lived here, almost 72 years. His wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Willis, died 57 years ago. Mr. Willis was 85.

Mr. Willis drove six, eight and 10-team horses for the Indianapolis Brewery Co. for more than 30 years and once drove President and Mrs. Cleveland in a parade here in 1886. He received a bouquet of flowers from Mrs. Cleveland in token of a special harness he designed for the President's carriage.

During prohibition he worked several years for the Pennsylvania railroad as a crossing-watchman and detective. He was employed as a janitor by the school board at the time of his retirement about 16 years ago.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Grace Mae Hare, North Vernon; three granddaughters, Mrs. Lola Lewellen and Miss Mildred Hare, both of 4921 Matthews ave., and Mrs. Helen Kohler, Columbus, and four great-grandchildren.
