A. race, the team has been doing much better recently. . . . In their last 33 games, they won 19, lost 13 and tied one. . . . Not bad. . . . Indianapolis' Bill Talbert went to the national amateur tennis finals at Forest Hills, N. Y., by defeating Francisco Segura, then was beaten by Frankie Parker, an army sergeant from Muroc Field, Calif. . . . Rhodius park swimmers won the Jack Shaffer memorial trophy in the annual championship meet at Garfield park. . . . The Hoosier college football season is getting under way. The high school season opens this week-end, although most teams will not get under way for another week or two. . . . Bert (Red) Haviland has been named head basketball coach at Southport high school.

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Local Flier Freed

SEVERAL LOCAL fliers were released from prison camps in Romania when that country joined the allies. . . . The local Red Cross made public a report on the physical condition of 60 wounded American prisoners of war held in Romania. . . . The report that allied wounded were receiving the same treatment as German wounded relieved the home folks. . . . Freeman field, near Seymour, Ind., has been selected as the site for the army's first helicopter training school. . . . Hundreds of German prisoners of war have been helping in the tomato fields and canneries, thus averting a possibly serious labor shortage. . . . Harvest of Jonathan apples now is under way in southern Indiana.

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Stickers for Jaywalkers

THE SAFETY BOARD is considering a proposed ordinance permitting police to hand traffic stickers to pedestrians who jaywalk and otherwise violate traffic rules. . . . That way, the erring walkers could pay their fines in cafeteria court instead of going to trial. . . . Lawrence P. Parsons, city personnel director, said discharged war veterans will be given preference in filling municipal jobs. . . . Bernard A. Lynch, chief of the city fire prevention department, died of a heart attack as he was preparing to go to a ball game. . . . Alex L. Taggart, county rationing administrator, notified motorists that "A" coupon gasoline books will be renewed Sept. 18, 19 and 20 at selected public schools. . . . The park department is suffering from a serious manpower shortage, with the return to school of many youths who held summer jobs. . . . Some of the factories, stores and other business firms are finding it difficult to replace their employees who have quit to go back to school.
