Cmdr. Essex Home After Service Around the World

Three campaign ribbons decorate the uniform of Cmdr. S. L. Essex, Indianapolis veteran of 18 years with the maritime service, who is home after nine months' service in New Guinea.

The commander participated in the invasions of Hollandia and the Admiralty Islands and also has served in Africa, Italy, England and Russia.

He served on a convoy between Nova Scotia and England which lost 16 ships, and was a member of one crew which made a voyage of 37,000 miles. This voyage was a round trip from South America to South and East Africa.

His experiences include treks

through the jungles of New Guinea. He was under fire in many air raids. The husband of Mrs. Hazel Essex, 2837 N. Station st., Cmdr. Essex is home on a 30-day leave. He has three children, Jack Lewis, 4; Charles Allen, 3, and Karen Sue, 1.

On his return trip he was aboard a ship with 250 Italian prisoners from Mers-El-Kiblr. He has a collection of Jap equipment, which is on display at the WAVE recruitment office in the Electric building.

The collection includes Jap helmets, uniforms, two-toed shoes, wooden clogs with an admiral's name on them, chop sticks, shells, bayonets, knives, money, machetes, a megaphone and silk and wool blankets.

The commander is a graduate of Technical high school and before entering the service was employed by the Indianapolis Power & Light Co.
