

## BAPTISTS MEET HERE OCT. 9-11

Plan Pageant Honoring  
Service Men for  
Conclave.

A pageant to honor Baptist youths from Indiana now in the armed forces will be held during the Indiana Baptist convention here Oct. 9, 10 and 11.

More than 1000 delegates from 440 churches will hear addresses by speakers at sessions in the First Baptist church.

Miss Blanche Edgar, former missionary to China, and Dr. Carroll O. Morong of Chicago, central regional representative of the Baptist Council on finance and promotion, New York.

Dr. Weldon M. Wilson of Chicago will be the closing speaker employing the convention theme, "Victory Through Christ."

The Rev. C. D. Strother of New Albany, convention president, will preside. Dr. Clive McGuire, executive secretary of the Indianapolis Baptist association, will give the welcome address, and Dr. C. W. Atwater, host pastor, is in charge of arrangements.

Baptist women of the state with Mrs. R. R. Mitchell, president, in charge, will meet simultaneously with the convention as will Baptist pastors of the state. Dr. J. Marion Smith of Muncie is president of the pastors' conference. The laymen's session of the convention will be addressed by Chauncey E. Brockway of Sharon, Pa. Will R. Barr of Bluffton is the laymen's president, and Dr. A. Cohn, Seymour, pageant director.

### Skipper to Tell Of Invasion Roles

CAPT. ROGER C. HEIMER, commanding officer of the St. Louis coast guard district, will tell some of his experiences skippering a combat transport in three invasions at a Junior Chamber of Commerce luncheon tomorrow in the Washington hotel.

The U.S.S. Samuel Chase, a coast guard man-of-war under Capt. Heimer's command, was the only American naval combat transport to land at North Africa, Sicily and Salerno. Capt. Heimer holds the Legion of merit with a gold star.

### CONVENTION OPENED BY PARK EXECUTIVES

Approximately 100 park and recreation experts from throughout the nation convened at the Hotel Lincoln today for opening sessions of the annual joint concclave of the American Institute of Park Executives and the American Park society.

Indianapolis park superintendent Paul V. Brown said the Indianapolis park board would press its search for a full-time recreation director at the three-day conclave. So far three candidates are under consideration. They are Leo Sanders, Anderson; Mark Cowen, Birmingham, and Hugh W. Middleworth, former city recreation director, now an army major.

### Ration Calendar

MEAT—Red stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through G5 in Book 4 good indefinitely for 10 points each.

SUGAR—Stamps 30, 31, 32 and 33 in Book 4 are good indefinitely for 5 pounds. Stamp 40 in Book 4 good for 5 pounds of canning sugar. No one is eligible for additional home canning sugar except those who produce for sale.

Applicants applying for canning sugar should send in one spare stamp 37, attached to the application for each applicant.

CANNED GOODS—Blue stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through L5 in Book 4 good indefinitely for 10 points each.

Buoy tokens expire Sept. 30. Through Sept. 30 tokens can be used only in multiples of 10.

SHOES—No. 1 and No. 2 "airplane" stamps in Book 3 good indefinitely.

GASOLINE—Stamp A-13 for 4 gallons through Dec. 21; B3, B4 and B5 and C3, C4 and C5 good for 5 gallons; T (3d quarter) good for 5 gallons through Sept. 30; E, E1 and E2 good for 1 gallon; R, R1 and R2 are good for 5 gallons but are not valid at filling stations. Consumer may exchange R for E at his local board to purchase non-highway gasoline.

FUEL OIL—Period 4 and 5 coupons valid through Aug. 31, 1945. All change-making coupons and reserve coupons are now good. Period 1 good immediately.

TIRES—Commercial vehicle tire inspection every six months or every 5000 miles. Inspection certificates on passenger automobiles needed for replacement tires. B card holders are now eligible for grade 1 tires if they can prove extreme necessity. All A holders are eligible for grade 3 tires, including factory seconds, if they find tires which may be purchased.

## Soldiers Guide to United States Warns of 'Hardship,' Soft Beds and Hot Water

"Water comes out of faucets un-

chlorinated. It is wise to carry a

small packet of chlorine tablets

with you. To make doubly sure

place the water in a litter bag be-

fore using.

"One must be cautious when or-

dering drinks in bars and saloons.

Bartenders try to sell old, aged stocks of Scotch and Bourbon. Don't be taken in by such practices. Some of the whisky is very old and ob-

viously spoiled.

"If 'Dago Red' or 'Blonk' wine

isn't available, it is wise to carry a

small flask of alcohol and 10 per

cent octane gasoline with you.

"The country is run by Repub-

licans, Democrats and Frank Si-

natra. It's a big place because it

stretches all the way across the

country. Keep on your toes and

you will get along okay."


