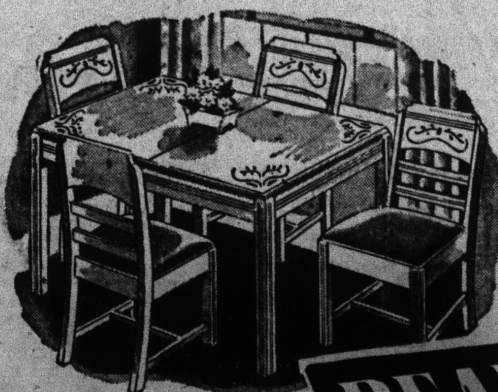

NEW UNIT FORMS FOR GREENWOOD

Independent Voters Group
Opposed to Record of
Landis.

BLOOMINGTON, Sept. 28.—For-
mation of the Independent Voters
Committee of the seventh congres-
sional district which will support the
Democratic congressional nominee,
Arthur Greenwood, was announced
here today.

The committee stated that its
purpose was to encourage the regis-
tration of qualified voters and to
support, without regard to party
affiliation, the candidates whose
records show them to be the best
qualified.

The committee said it could not
support the incumbent Republican
congressman, Gerald W. Landis,
"because of his continued isolation-
ist stand."

Mr. Greenwood, the committee
said, has shown by statements and
voting record when he was in con-
gress that "he supports effective in-
ternational organization."

Capehart Blasts Schricker Speech

CONNERSVILLE, Sept. 28.—
Homer E. Capehart, G. O. P. sena-
torial nominee, declared at a party
rally here last night that his op-
ponent, Governor Schricker, "led
the way in injecting ridicule and
wisecracks into the political cam-
paign."

"Candidate Roosevelt, making his
political speech from Washington,
was only aping the Indiana Demo-
cratic senatorial nominee when he
indulged in sarcasm and sought to
laugh off Governor Dewey with un-
digested wisecracks," Mr. Capehart
said.

The G. O. P. candidate said that
the governor, in his speech at
French Lick to Democratic editors,
began the practice which was taken
up by the President.

"I seek election for senator as an
enthusiastic Dewey supporter," Mr.
Capehart said. "My opponent is
anti-Dewey."

He said he was sure that sup-
porters of the Dewey-Brickey ticket
would not "snipe" at the Re-
publican presidential nominee by
casting a vote for a Democratic
senator.

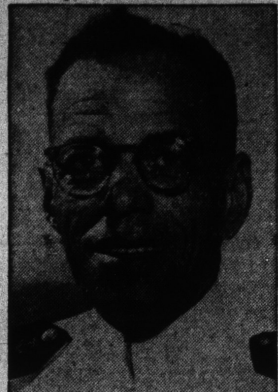
James Raps P. A. C. Actions

Foreign Policy Questionnaire Sent to Indiana Candidates

The Indiana Committee for Vic-
tory, a non-partisan citizens' or-
ganization promoting international
co-operation, today sent a ques-
tionnaire to all U. S. senatorial and
congressional candidates to obtain
their views on post-war foreign
policy.

The committee will publish about
Oct. 16 a summary of the positions
taken by the various candidates.
The committee said it believed
the united nations must remain
united to (1) promote economic

security and human welfare through
international co-operation; (2) es-
tablish rule of international law
and make aggression illegal through-
out the world; (3) to establish an
organization to maintain this rule
of law and to promote international
co-operation; and (4) to provide an
organization with a force capable of
prompt and certain action.

their opinions on these various
points.

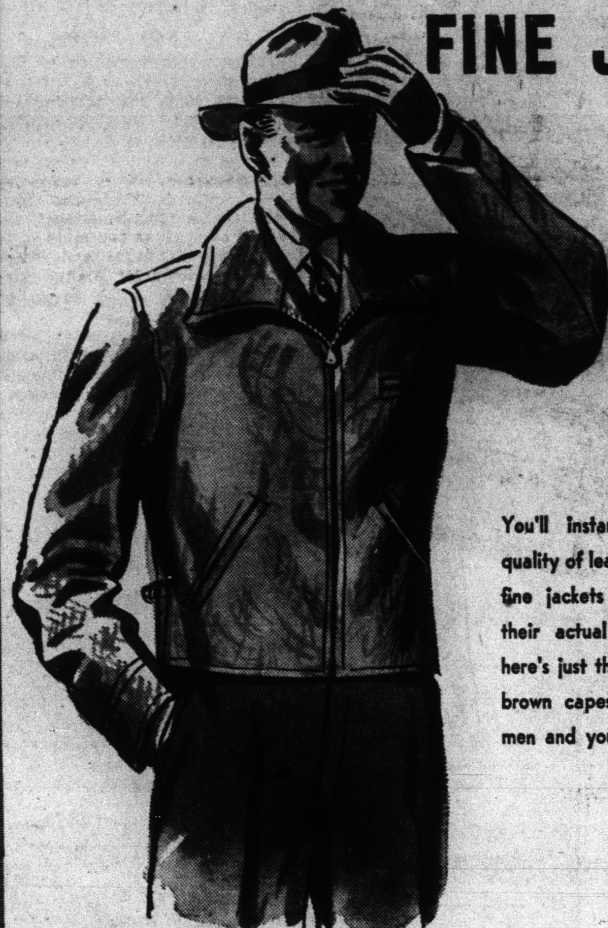
