GOP Appointees Listed in
Senate Bid Pledge of
Fairness.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Oct. 3.—Governor Schricker, Democratic U. S. senatorial nominee, said in a talk here last night that if he is elected he will strive to represent all the people of Indiana.

"An example of what I mean by all of the people may be found in the appointments of judges and prosecutors that I have made when the elected officials were called to military service," he said.

"During my administration, I have appointed 18 Republican prosecutors and five Republican circuit judges. These appointments were made on recommendations of the men who were leaving their offices to fight for their country. In addition, I appointed a Republican to succeed James M. Tucker when he resigned as secretary of state to accept a commission in the navy."

The governor asserted that he did not use his high office to build up a political machine in Indiana and that during his administration there were no persecutions for political reasons.

"I feel greatly indebted," he said, "for the high honors the people have bestowed upon me, and if they send me to Washington, I will continue to do the job as I have conscientiously tried to do in the past. I believe the people of Indiana know me and what I have done. My record is an open book and I stand upon it in the coming election."

**INSPECTION SLATED
FOR SCHOOL BUSES**

Indiana state police will begin their annual inspection of school buses this week, Don F. Stiver, state police chief, announced today.

He said that an outstanding safety record has resulted from the annual police inspection of the state's 5757 buses.

During the last two school years, only one student was killed and 22 injured in school bus accidents in the state. Eighty-two school bus accidents were reported during that period.

The safe driving record made by Indiana's school bus drivers becomes all the more remarkable when one considers the tremendous mileage piled up daily by nearly 5000 vehicles," Mr. Stiver said.

Mechanical inspection of buses will be rigid this year because of wartime deterioration, Mr. Stivers said. Troopers will list defects and garages making repairs will send a form to state police certifying compliance with the repair order.

STOLEN FROM TRUCK**


