JAPS REPORT SEVEN ADMIRALS KILLED

Japanese Domei agency today said the death of seven Japanese rear admirals had been announced by the Yokosuka naval station, one of Japan's four major imperial navy yards, which is commanded by Adm. Naokuni Nomura, former navy minister in the Tojo cabinet.

The Japanese agency, in a dispatch to the controlled press of East Asia recorded by FCO monitors, identified the dead officers as Kanichi Hagihara, Sorokuro Morino, Toseburo Ogura, Fujii Arima, Shunzo Akasawa, Ryo Mori and Seiko Mikumoto.

The dispatch gave no details as to how the high-ranking naval officers met their deaths nor whether they had been killed at the yard, about 60 airline miles from Tokyo where warships and naval auxiliaries of all types and sizes are built for the Japanese navy.

Domei also failed to mention whether the deaths occurred over a period of time or simultaneously.

Nomura was appointed to the post of commander of the yard following his resignation from the cabinet of Gen. Hideki Tojo.

Porter Talks to Safety Council

CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—Earl D. Porter, chairman of the program committee of the fleet division of the Indianapolis safety council was one of the principal speakers at the 33d national safety congress here today.

He declared that although drivers are delivering a larger annual load with less equipment and fewer men on the job, fleet accidents have shown only a slight increase.

"Sound programs of safety education that reach each driver will help hold accidents to a minimum," Mr. Porter said in his panel discussion.

Smoke Inspection Staff Due For a Shake-Up on Jan. 1

Its status is a bit smoggy now, but the city smoke inspection staff is due for a shake-up Jan. 1. Personnel Director Larry Parsons announced today.

Mr. Parsons cleared the air somewhat by asserting that Chief Smoke Inspector David Matthews will be demoted at that time to the rank of "smoke inspector" and his top command taken over by a qualified combustion engineer yet to be named.

Because of salary readjustments made by the J. L. Jacobs municipal survey, however, Mr. Matthews will receive \$2400 next year as compared with the \$2100 he now makes as department head.

The combustion engineer, first in the city's history, is slated to receive \$3000.

Mr. Matthews was the subject of a controversial smog stirred up last winter by the mayor's smoke abatement committee, which demanded his dismissal.

In the January shift, Charles Symmes, present smoke inspector, will climb the high tower atop the Merchants bank building as "smoke observer." The incumbent "smoke observer," John Burcham, will climb down—and out, Mr. Parsons intimated.

BRITISH LIST HITLER AS WAR CRIMINAL

LONDON, Oct. 4 (U. P.).—Prime Minister Winston Churchill told commons today that Adolf Hitler, Hermann Goering, Paul Joseph Goebbels and Heinrich Himmler are on the British list of war criminals.

"I am not in a position to make a statement about the united nations at this time," he added.

OPENS CONFERENCE

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Oct. 4 (U. P.).—A three-day 45th annual conference of the Indiana Municipal League opened today with officials registered from most of the 500 Hoosier cities and towns.

President Jesse I. Pavey, mayor of South Bend, presided at the opening session, and Mayor Vernon R. McMillan of the host city welcomed the delegates.

FT. WAYNE SLAYING ADMITTED BY YOUTH

FT. WAWNE, Ind., Oct. 4.—Spurred by the reported confession of a discharged sailor held in jail at Elgin, Ill., police today resumed their investigation of the mysterious murders of three Ft. Wayne women whose bodies have been found on lonely roadsides at the outskirts of the city during the past 10 months.

Police Chief Jule Stumpf said that George Brockner, 19, had admitted raping Anna Kuznetz, 20-year-old defense worker whose body was found May 23, and that Brockner will be given a lie detector test today at Elgin where he was questioned yesterday by Stumpf and police detectives.
