

Mr. and Mrs. William T. Dennis, 969 English ave., has been missing over Germany since Sept. 13.

Gunner on a B-24, he has been in the army since September, 1943, and overseas since June. He is 19. In civilian life he was a truck driver and attended school in Millard, Ill. His family was notified Sept. 29 that he was missing.

Sgt. Dennis has one brother in the army, Sgt. Estel Dennis, in the Admiralty Islands, and two brothers, Robert and Charles, and a sister, Mrs. Annis Sancher, in Indianapolis.

Pfc. Harry D. Sullivan, husband of Mrs. Marian Sullivan, 2174 N. Talbot st., and son of Mrs. Blanche Sullivan, 12 S. Harris st., is missing in action in Italy.

His wife received a telegram yesterday, informing her that her husband had been missing in action with an infantry division of the 5th army since Sept. 18.

Pfc. Sullivan, 21, had been in service since May, 1943, and has been overseas since May, 1944. He has a brother, John A. Sullivan, ship's cook 3-c, in California.

He attended St. Anthony grade school and was graduated from Washington high school. Before entering service he worked for the Hoffman Specialty Co.

Pvt. Robert W. Zwyers, paratrooper with an infantry division in France, has been missing since D-day.

The 20-year-old paratrooper has been overseas since January and was reported missing in August. He is the stepson of Harry Campbell, 1222 Standard ave.

Before he entered the service in October, 1942, he was employed at the Diamond Chain Manufacturing Co. He was educated at the Soldiers and Sailor's home in Knightsbridge where he played on the football team and in the band.

He has a brother in the navy, Seaman 1-c Thomas E. Zwyers, and a sister in Indianapolis, Mrs. Virginia Sullivan.

Pfc. Harold J. Thompson, son of Mrs. Lillian Greer, 2132 W. Minnesota st., and Guy Thompson of near Chicago, has been missing in action since July 3 in France.

A member of the U. S. army reserve since 1939, he went overseas with an infantry division in 1942. He fought in Africa, Italy and on the Anzio beachhead before he went into France on D-day.

The 24-year-old soldier went to school in Illinois and worked for the telephone company there before entering service.

Lt. John J. Sullivan, husband of Mrs. Josephine Sullivan, 232 Hendricks pl., and son of Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Sullivan, 1841 E. Ohio st., has been missing in action over Germany since Aug. 24.

Co-pilot on a B-24 Liberator bomber, he is 21 and has been in service two years. He served overseas three months at a time. He was reported missing. Lt. Sullivan has a 20-month-old daughter, Kathleen Marie. He is a graduate of Technical high school.

He holds the air medal and two oak leaf clusters and has been on 19 missions.

Lt. John B. Stewart, formerly of 3715 N. Meridian st., son of Mrs. Madeline E. Stewart of Passaic, N. J., is missing in action over France since Aug. 28.

Pilot of a P-47 Thunderbolt fighter, Lt. Stewart is 26. A former employee of the Curtiss-Wright Corp., he entered the army two and one-half years ago and went overseas in May. A brother, Cpl. Charles Stewart, is at Camp Van Dore, Miss.

Pfc. Roy B. Ridgeway, husband of Mrs. Mary Bess Ridgeway, 148 W. 9th st., was wounded July 10 in France. He is now in the hospital in England, prior to being transferred back to service.

Pfc. Ridgeway, who is 25, received a foot injury. He is a member of the 83d division which trained at Camp Atterbury and which recently captured 20,000 German soldiers.
