

BOARD FORMED BY METHODISTS

Area Council to Direct
Crusade for Christ and
Other Affairs.

Representatives of the Indiana church organized a new Methodist area council yesterday in the Roberts Park Methodist church.

The council will direct the Crusade for Christ program and all other affairs of the Indianapolis Methodist area during the coming four years. Bishop Titus Lowe of the Indianapolis area is council chairman. Indianapolis ministers on the council include Dr. Guy O. Carpenter, district superintendent; Dr. John F. Edwards, pastor of the Broadway Methodist church; Dr. D. L. Browning of the North Methodist church, and Dr. S. L. Martin of the Roberts Park church.

Embodies Five Programs

The Crusade for Christ embodies these five programs: The promotion of a new world order; a four-year evangelistic campaign; an attempt to increase Sunday school attendance; an emphasis on stewardship, and the rebuilding of missions destroyed by war.

A sum of \$25,000,000 will be raised outside the routine offerings of the denomination, to finance the crusade for Christ. The crusade will be launched in Indiana with 17 rallies held between Oct. 8 and 15.

The rally in Indianapolis on Oct. 15 will be addressed by the Rev. Claude Garrison, Mishawaka; Dr. Wesley Bransford, Anderson; Dr. E. Burns Martin, South Bend; the Rev. B. B. Shale, Ft. Wayne; Dr. A. W. Pugh, Muncie; the Rev. Jesse Fox, Kokomo, and the Rev. Howard Brown, Richmond.

ARMY LISTS 300,382 PRISONERS IN U. S.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (U. P.).—The war department revealed yesterday that 300,382 prisoners of war were held within the continental limits of the United States as of Oct. 1.

There were 248,205 Germans, 51,034 Italians and 1143 Japanese at 131 base camps and approximately 300 branch camps in all sections of the United States. The branch camps are designed to place prisoners near current work projects.

Ration Calendar

MEAT—Red stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through K5 in Book 4 good indefinitely for 10 points each.

CANNED GOODS—Blue stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through R5 in Book 4 good indefinitely for 10 points each. No more blue stamps will become valid until Nov. 1.

SUGAR—Stamps 30, 31, 32 and 33 in Book 4 are good indefinitely for 5 pounds. Stamp 40 in Book 4 good for 5 pounds of canning sugar. Applicants applying for canning sugar should send in one spare stamp 37, attached to the application for each applicant.

GASOLINE—Stamp A-13 for 4 gallons through Dec. 21. B4 and C4, B5 and C5 good for 5 gallons; T (4th quarter) good for 5 gallons through Dec. 31. E, E1 and E2 good for 1 gallon; R, R-1 and R2 are good for 5 gallons but are not valid at filling stations.

SHOES—No. 1 and No. 2 "airplane" stamps in Book 3 good indefinitely. A new stamp will become valid Nov. 1.

TIRES—Commercial vehicle tire inspection every six months or every 8000 miles. B card holders are now eligible for grade 1 tires if they can prove extreme necessity. All A holders are eligible for grade 3 tires, if they find tires which may be purchased.

FUEL OIL—Period 4 and 5 coupons valid through Aug. 31, 1945. All change-making coupons and reserve coupons are now good. Fuel oil rations for 1944-45 heating season now being issued. Period 1 good immediately.
