Delegates from 400 churches will attend the Indiana Baptist convention Monday through Wednesday in the First Baptist church.

The state Baptist pastors' conference also will meet Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning and the Indiana Woman's Baptist Mission society Tuesday morning in the First church.

The Tuesday evening session of the convention will be in charge of Baptist laymen of the state and a chorus of laymen will sing. Chauncey E. Brockway, an attorney of Sharon, Pa., will give an address on "A Layman Looks at the Jobs Men Want." In the afternoon, the Rev. C. D. Strother of New Albany will speak on "Our Post-War Task."

Power Blackout Threatened By C. I. O. in Northeast Ohio


CLEVELAND, Oct. 7 (U.P.)—The imminence of a paralyzing power blackout, which would shut off electricity in 350,000 homes, cripple Cleveland's electrically-operated transportation system and halt production in several hundred war plants, threatened northeastern Ohio today.

As 1770 C. I. O. employees of the Cleveland Electric Illuminating Co. voted "to strike or not," United Utility Workers union officials refused to reveal strike plans "until the opportune moment."

The strike vote, call, made by the union on Sept. 7, resulted when the regional war labor board rejected a labor-management proposal to raise employees' wages 7 cents an hour.

Trio to Represent Local Lutherans at Convention

Dr. Homer E. Turney, president of the Indiana United Lutheran synod, Dr. R. H. Benting, and O. K. Jensen will represent the denomination's churches of this community at the convention of the United Lutheran church in Minneapolis Wednesday through Oct. 17.

Dr. Benting is the pastor of St. Mark's United Lutheran church, one of 10 of the denomination's churches in Marion county. Mr. Jensen is a local layman.

Dr. Laubach To Be Heard

Famed Educator to Address Mass Meeting Tuesday.

Dr. Frank C. Laubach, who is internationally known for his work among the illiterates of the world, will address a mass meeting in the Second Presbyterian church Tues-

day at 7:45 p.m. Dr. Laubach, Congregational missionary, is sponsored by the ecumenical committee of the church federation in co-operation with the council of churchwomen, the Missionary Education Institute and the United Christian Missionary so-

ciety.

The speaker developed his simple method of teaching illiterates while working among the Moros of the Philippine islands. His system brought such phenomenal success that he has extended it to India, Africa, Ceylon, Turkey, Malaya, Mexico and South America. Dr. Laubach picks illiterates at random from street or field and teaches them to read in an exceedingly short time. Some have actually learned to decipher the printed page in less than an hour while others take a day or several days.

The time required to teach an illiterate to read usually depends upon the I. Q. of the pupil and how complex or difficult his native language may be, Dr. Laubach says. The Laubach method, however, has been tested and found pedagogically sound by Columbia university educators. It has been applied to about 80 languages and dialects.

Dr. John B. Ferguson, chairman of the sponsoring committee, will preside, and Dr. Jean S. Milner, host pastor, will give the scripture reading and prayer. Prof. Charles F. Hansen will play the organ and Maurice Nord will sing. Deacons of the Second church will serve as ushers.
