

SCHRICKER PAYS WILLKIE HONOR

Candidate for U. S. Senate
Addresses Rally at
Batesville.

BATESVILLE, Ind., Oct. 10.—Governor Schricker, Democratic nominee for U. S. senator, paid tribute to Wendell L. Willkie as a "great liberal and outstanding champion for the rights of man" at a three-county Democratic rally here last night.

The governor said he believed that if Mr. Willkie had lived he would have played an important part in writing the peace.

"He would have been, in my opinion, of invaluable service at the peace table," the governor said.

Mr. Schricker detailed what he termed the "achievements" of the last three Democratic state administrations.

Jackson Attacks GOP Record in Indiana

WABASH, Ind., Oct. 10.—Senator Samuel D. Jackson, Democratic senatorial nominee, declared in a talk here last night that the efforts of my opponent (Ralph Gates) to ride into the governor's office on the coattails of Governor Dewey is proving a vain effort.

Senator Jackson said his requests to Mr. Gates "to compare the administration of Ed Jackson and Warren T. McCray with the last four years of our administration were unanswered."

Challenges Gates

"I still am trying," said Senator Jackson, "to have Mr. Gates tell upon what theory his candidacy gives promise of the Schricker brand of good government in the light of his alliance with the present state leadership of his party."

"I have asked for a revelation of his part in the nomination of Homer E. Capehart, if any."

He said that if the voters "have a look at the record . . . many rank-and-file Republicans will not vote for my distinguished opponent—not because of anything I say, but because of the recent history of their own party—a story they do not like, written by men whose actions they do not approve."
