

## 4670 WAR FUND PLEDGES GIVEN

Talk by Veteran Features First Report Meeting Of Campaign.

The first-hand horrors of war have not penetrated the continental shores of the United States and we who have been spared this can prove our deep sense of thankfulness by helping those less fortunate.

With these words, L. L. Goodman, general chairman of the United War and Community Fund, at the first report meeting held yesterday in the Claypool hotel proclaimed the current campaign to raise \$1,975,000 by Oct. 26.

First reports indicated 4670 pledges have been made to date, totaling \$340,664.75. This represents 12.2 per cent of the quota.

Feature of the luncheon-meeting was a solemn description of the reaction of a wounded service man by Chief Petty Officer George C. Stumpf, former Indianapolis fireman. Now recovered from burns that covered 70 per cent of his body, Stumpf said:

"The person who questions the value of the work being done for those in the armed services all over the world by the USO, prisoners' aid, United Seaman's service and other fund agencies should experience personally the hardships of military combat life and observe at first-hand what is being done with the money given this country."

The next report will be made tomorrow at the Claypool.

## TWO NAZI PRISONERS ESCAPE IN FRANKLIN

Two German prisoners of war escaped from the Morgan Packing Co. at Franklin last night, the FBI disclosed today.

The men, Frans Copplach, 33, and Wilhelm Schulz, 34, were consigned to Camp Atterbury, and were working on the 2 to 11 p. m. shift at the packing company. They were discovered missing at 11.

Neither of the fugitives is believed to speak English. They were wearing blue denim work clothes, with the initials "P. W." on the back. Copplach is about 5 feet 7, weighs 160, and has brown eyes and brown hair, while Schulz is 5 feet 11, and weighs 195. Schulz has gray eyes, black hair, and wears glasses.

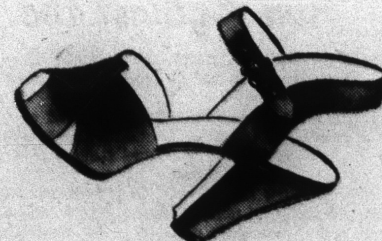

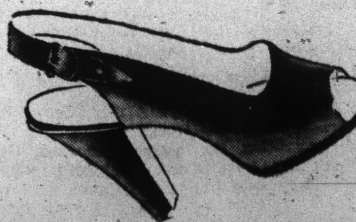
