Gypsy Princess Turns Out to Be Balkan Bogeywoman.

A gypsy princess who turns at will into a great, gaunt wolf is the subject of the "Cry of the Werewolf," Columbia picture that opened yesterday at the Lyric theater.

That particular Balkan bogeywoman finds sanctuary in New Orleans with a transient tribe of Transylvanians.

Scientist Murdered.

The motive for the first savage killing is to keep a scientist, Fritz Leiber, from discovering that Nina Foch, the gypsy princess, is the daughter of Marie La Tour. The other wolfish attacks are meant to cover up evidence.

Most of the action takes place either in the gypsy camp or in the old La Tour house which has been converted into a museum for psychic research.

There are a few amusing sequences between a hard-boiled police lieutenant who doesn't believe in spooks or any allied creatures and a detective who is more credulous.

The Love Interest

The sad faced apple with something resembling a British accent who guides visitors around the La Tour manse for hire is scared completely silly by the odd goings on.

There is, of course, the necessary love interest, at times involving the gypsy princess as a third party, and a certain amount of witchcraft to boot.

The producers go to great lengths to make their theme plausible and throw in a few dashes of demonology and voodooism for good measure. "Soul of a Monster" is the second feature. (By Robert J. Fox.)

U. S. AIR UNIT BASES ON EX-NAZI FIELDS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12 (U. P.)—An army air forces spokesman disclosed today that the entire U. S. army ninth tactical air force has been moved from the British Isles and is now based in airfields in liberated France and Belgium.

The spokesman said that units of the RAF were also based on the continent but that their number was not as great as that of the American ninth.

He revealed that the U. S. fliers are now using 25 airfields which formerly belonged to the Luftwaffe.
